

Bishop R. C. Evans, Head of Christian Brotherhood, Had Notable Career.

Following less than a week's illness the death occurred suddenly yesterday norning at four o'clock of Bishop R C. Evans, head and founder of the Church of the Christian Brotherhood on Caer-Howell street. He caught a chill last Wednesday, which rapidly developed into pleuro-pneumonia, to which he succumbed. Bishop Evans, who was in his sixtieth year, was born at St. Andrew's, Quebec, near Montreal, but at the age of four years was taken by his parents to London, Ont. where in 1882 he was ordained a priest in the Church of the Latter Day Saints. In 1884 he became an elder, a high priest in 1887, a counsellor to Joseph Smith and one of the first presidency in 1902, and a hishop in 1909. In 1918 he severed his connection with the church.
