In the first it received twenty-two days; in the second, thirty-one; and in the last, thirty. Julius Cæsar restored the day of which Numa had deprived this month, and which by it is still retained.— The etymology is doubtful. But Plutarch says the month was called May from Maia, the mother of Mercury; for to him it was sacred. Our Saxon ancestors, after the Romans, callit Maius-month; and, in their native language, Tri-milchi, three-milk month, when cows were milked three times adday.
