THE EXHIBITION

(Continued from Page 1.)

from the written copy to the printed page. The counter is covered with mats, held in place by linotype slugs, the curved plates made from the matrices extend up both posts at each side of the booth. Back of the booth is a picture of the Telegraph-Times building surrounded by copies of the Telegraph and Times printed on white cotton cloth.

Overhead decorations are of tri-color bunting. The Ivy Tobacco Company has secured the space under the band stand, and makes a first class show of their brands of tobacco.

W. A. Simonds, representing Lipton's Limited, has a most booth in which he shows the various products of the Lipton concern in the way of preserved goods, confectionaries, etc.

The New Brunswick Board of Education illustrates the work of manual training in the two large spaces which come next to view. The display is in charge of T. B. Kidner and will be an eye-opener to those who are not familiar with the purpose of manual training. Specimens of work done by pupils in the public schools will be shown and demonstrations of the work will be given during the week.

Railway Exhibits

The next booth might be labelled Picturesque Canada from St. John to the Pacific. It is the exhibit of the C. P. R., and consists of views of scenery along the great railway, hunting and fishing trophies from mountain, forest and stream, and souvenirs which bring the visitor to the west land, the lake region, the gold fields, the great prairies, the wheat fields, the mountains and finally the gentle Pacific.

An electric illumination of the letters C. P. R. is in a place of honor at the background of the booth. Literature descriptive of Canada and illustrating towns which the road offers, will be distributed here, and all information desired will be gladly given.

The Intercolonial exhibit adjoins that of the C. P. R. and the government road makes a highly creditable display. The handsome heavy brass railing which was used in the I. C. R. exhibit at St. Louis, is in place at the exhibition here. Moose heads, splendidly mounted, and a variety of fish and pictures illustrating the fine scenic country which the I. C. R. passes through, adorn the walls of the space which the road offers, and all information desired will be gladly given.

The Deschamps Company make a good display of their products in the same space they occupied last year.

The St. John Railway Company have a large space allotted into the booth, separated by green and pale yellow draperies, which are the colors dominating the booth. They make a first class showing of ranges, heaters, etc., while the variety of the advantages to be obtained by using gas for cooking and other household purposes.

C. D. Jones has a booth where dukes and souvenirs will be on sale. Manchester Robertson Allison Ltd. make a splendid display of office and library furniture in the large space at the end of the wing formerly occupied by the Lawton Show Company. The space is splendidly decorated and every article in the up-to-date office or library is shown.

An Out of Town Firm

One of the most artistic displays in the building comes next into view. It is that of J. M. Humphrey Sons, of Moncton, and as the first time this firm has exhibited at a St. John fair, Messrs. Humphrey show a splendid line of cloths of their own manufacture, and make a display of their men's suitings, etc., to be seen. They are tastefully displayed on hangers and drums, so the whole has the effect of an especially well dressed window in which is displayed a choice line of goods. A fine and particularly complete line of ladies' cloths, which the firm is manufacturing this year for the first time, is also shown and is the subject of much attention from passers by. Altogether the Moncton firm has reason to be particularly well pleased with their first display at a St. John exhibition.

Across from the Humphrey booth P. Campbell makes a good display of acetylene gas generators and heaters, hot water heaters, heaters, etc., while George Willett shows patent winery, and the Canadian Oil Company makes a good display of kerosene and fuel oil. The Independent Order of Foresters have a neat and attractive display of stoves and ranges. E. D. Smithers shows jams and jellies. C. D. Little shows and makes a fine display of the Havocbook Mineral Spring Company has a second refreshment booth.

The D. K. McLaren building shows rubber belting. Mr. Witham has a booth for the manufacture of pop corn, while the Copeland Scale Company and the Duffless Bros. Company have adjoining booths in which the good qualities of their products are demonstrated.

The Amherst Starch Company, for which E. T. Sturdee is agent, has a booth opposite the Dunlop Cooke booth. They have a pyramid of their starch starch in fancy boxes, while the large wall space at the end is taken by Shirley & Dittich, of Galt, Ontario, who make a large exhibit of saws.

T. J. Phillips has a pagoda for the sale of candies, and the Willis Piano Company, of Halifax, makes a fine display of their pianos. J. Harvey Brown has an exhibit of toys in a neat booth near the luncheon counter, where a cup of the invigorating beverage may be had for the asking.

In the Gallery

On ascending to the gallery at the northern end of the main building, John Froehman's exhibit of photographs and gunnery, and the first to meet the eye. Adjoining it, in a large and handsome parlor setting, E. H. S. Flood shows a number of fine pictures.

E. D. Foss & Co. of Boston have an appetizing display of chocolates in all the various styles, while very dainty specimens of fancy wares are on view in the next booth, shown by Mrs. Osborne. A

souvenir picture booth, presided over by Mr. Ferris, and a stand for the sale of dukes and souvenirs by Mr. Whitcomb come in the order named. W. H. Bell has a large exhibit of pianos shown in an attractive fashion, while exhibition visitors' eyes will be attracted by the display of optical goods shown by the St. John Optical Company.

To the housewife or seamstress the New Williams Manufacturing Company appeal with a line of their well-known sewing machines, shown in all styles and at all prices. Another confectionary stand, by Thomas J. Phillips tempts those with a sweet tooth, while Quinn's Bohemian glass blowers will do wonderful things with glass for a small fee. Mrs. Morgan's stand for the sale of exhibition souvenirs is next in order.

Then comes the floral exhibit, which runs to the end of the gallery. It is a particularly good one this year, the display of cut bloom and potted plants made by Messrs. McIntosh and H. E. Gould of Sussex, being especially fine. As well as a display of this class, the floral exhibit is displayed and arranged in the most effective manner and it is not difficult for a visitor to imagine himself in a great garden as the beautiful bloom meets his eye on every side.
