FIND CHARGES IN AGAIN SENSATION MAIN SUSTAINED IN POLICE WORK

Methodist Inquiry Into Statements By Minister
Detective Killen Today Handed In Resignation

Recommend a Change

Removal of Rev. Mr. King From Nashwaak to Another Circuit Suggested—The Reason Alleged For Unpatriotic Utterances

Eleven Years Patrol Duty and Rest in Plain Clothes Work and Had Won Good Name and Popular Esteem

Fredericton, N. B., March 26—The charge of having given expression to disloyal and un-British sentiments, preferred by J. W. Smith against Rev. J. K. King, minister of Nashwaak, was investigated by a committee of the Methodist Conference and sustained in nearly every particular. It was decided to admonish Rev. Mr. King for his utterances and to recommend his removal to another circuit at the close of the present year.

Rev. H. F. Wightman, president of the conference, was the presiding officer and associated with him was Rev. Thomas Marshall, chairman of the district. The members were Rev. Thomas Opie of Woodstock, Rev. Thomas Hicks of Marysville and Rev. J. B. Young of Stanley.

Rev. Mr. King was charged with using language unbecoming a Methodist minister and a loyal British subject. It was alleged that he had publicly stated that our volunteers had been duped into going out to fight by the British and Canadian governments, and had also commended the Canadian people to sending relief to the Belgians. The pastor had denied making the statements attributed to him and had denounced them as false and slanderous.

The evidence of several witnesses was taken and it was found that the charges in the main were sustained.

The committee in its report decided that Rev. Mr. King be required in future to refrain from speaking in condemnation of the Canadian and imperial governments so far as the present war was concerned and to refrain from all disloyal and unpatriotic utterances.

The committee of the opinion that his course is due to his belief in the doctrine of non-resistance carried to extreme which denies the right of a Christian state to make war under any circumstances. Certain contradictory statements made by Mr. King are attributed by the committee to a lapse of memory from which he seems to be suffering.

CELEBRATION IN FAIRVILLE

The thirtieth anniversary of No Surrender Lodge, I. O. G. T. was celebrated last evening in their rooms in Fairville by a fraternal gathering of their members and those of sister lodges in the city.

Wm. Arbo, chief templar, presided and addresses were given by Rev. W. G. Lane on "Foreign Temperance Work," E. N. Stockford, Grand Chief Templar, who dealt with general Canadian issues, and Harvey Arbo, who spoke of temperance in Fairville. The addresses were well received. The speakers referred to the work done in various parts in the interest of temperance and touched on matters of local and foreign interest in this connection. They said that temperance promotion was progressing in all parts of the world, and instanced the case of Russia as one of the greatest temperance achievements.

Throughout Canada the feeling was growing in favor of temperance, and Saskatchewan was referred to as proof, while of the other provinces it was said that much encouragement was being met with.

So far as Fairville was concerned, Mr. Arbo said that there was no fear. "No Surrender" lodge had no reason to feel discouraged, it had had an excellent year and prospects for 1915 were bright. Recitations were given by Lot. De Wolfe, Mr. Morrow and John Clarke and the meeting closed with the national anthem.
