## CLASS OF '77 PLAN RE-UNION FOR NEXT YEAR

Will Be Held in Conjunction With U. N. B. Encenia in May

A 30th anniversary reunion of the graduates of the class of 1877 is to be held in connection with the encenia of the U. N. B. in May of this year and a member of that class, Dr. Wallace Broad, of St. Andrews, has been chosen by the U. N. B. Alumni Society to be the alumni orator at the encenia.

In the absence of Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, the secretary, who had left for Europe, D. Gordon Willet acted as secretary of the meeting. Several new members, non-residents of the province, were received.

### TO MAKE ARRANGEMENTS

A committee consisting of C. McN. Steeves, Dr. B. C. Foster and Dr. W. S. Mylne was appointed to arrange for an alumni dinner on the night preceding the graduation exercises at the university in May.

The speaker of the evening at the alumni meeting was Professor Adam Cameron, who has been for 18 years professor of chemistry at the U. N. B. He gave an altogether delightful address, which held the fascinated attention of his hearers as he spoke of Scottish university life. Professor Cameron is a graduate of St. Andrews University in Scotland.

Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor of the university, announced that the attendance at the university this year exceeds all previous records, the present enrollment being 243 and all departments being crowded.

## COMMISSIONERS OF G.P.H. RESENT JURY VERDICT

Say Institution Should Not Have Been Brought Into Recent Case

"It was a fool verdict," declared Dr. C. M. Pratt at meeting of the commissioners of the General Public Hospital yesterday afternoon when the recent inquest into the causes of death of a patient, who died in the hospital, was under discussion.

M. E. Ager, president of the board, declared that while he was not supposed to make criticisms of what had been done in court, he did not appreciate the verdict which had stated that death had been due to septic poisoning and had been hastened by a fall but, which did not give any word of the cause of the septic poisoning.

It was stated by Dr. M. C. Case that Dr. H. L. Abramson had asserted that the woman had received no injury through her fall. R. H. Gale, superintendent, interposed to state that the woman had not fallen but had been endeavoring to get out of bed.

### BRINGS UP MATTER.

J. King Kelley first brought the matter before the meeting, and expressed his opinion that the hospital ought not to be summoned in such cases, but he advocated having the superintendent make an immediate report to the chief of police of every such case being admitted to the hospital.

Mr. Kelley resented having the hospital made a cloak for such cases and was ready to put his suggestion with regard to the notification of the chief of police in the form of motion.

Dr. Case said that he believed the verdict of the inquest as published was unfair. The verdict had said that the fall contributed to the death, which was absolutely wrong, he said.

Mr. Gale, superintendent, said that he had taken action in three cases that had been brought to the hospital. He also explained that the only deaths in the hospital, which were reported to the coroner, were those in which the cause of death had not been determined or where death had been by violence or from unnatural or suspicious causes.

Mr. Kelley's motion was not put but the matter was left over for further consideration.

## SUFFERS DAMAGE ON ATLANTIC VOYAGE

Italian Steamship Adelina, Now Here, Had Difficulty in Making Halifax

The Italian steamer Adelina here from Barrow-in-Furness, England, via Halifax, sustained damage estimated at \$22,000 on the way across, and only after difficulty, was able to make Halifax. The vessel left the other side on November 31, and encountered stormy weather all the way. On December 18 she sprang a leak. Two feet of water got into the holds, doing considerable damage to the cargo. The ship arrived at Halifax on December 21 and repairs were made.

Much credit was given to Captain Mario Patalano and his crew in Halifax, for being able to bring the ship into port. The Adelina is now at berth No. 3, Sand Point, fitting out for a cargo of grain for Italian ports. The ship's other officers are Cenzo Alberto, chief officer; Crovato Tilio, second officer; Bonaparte Getero, chief engineer; Michaeli Antonino; Gatto Luigi, wireless telegraph operator.
