TRADING ACTIVE AT MONTREAL; PRICES WEAKER

Brazilian, Leader, Gains 3-8;
Asbestos and Breweries
in Good Demand

IRREGULARITY IN WALL ST. MARKET

Erie Shares Strengthened on
Merger Reports; Moderate
Demand for Rails

MONTREAL, July 2.—Trading on the local stock exchange during the first half hour this morning was fairly active, with values displaying a weaker trend. Brazilian, the leader, opened at 9 1/4 for a gain of three-eighths, and in subsequent trading touched 9 1/2. Asbestos and breweries were in good demand, and came out unchanged at 76 and 41 respectively. The paper issues were moderately active, Abitibi recording a gain of a quarter at 76, while Price Bros. made half a point at 67. Shawinigan was the weak spot of the early trading at 208, down one point. Alcohol rose one-eighth at 19. In the unlisted division Attandu Engine scored a two point loss at 40.

IN WALL STREET
NEW YORK, July 2.—Pre-holiday adjustments resulted in considerable irregularity at the opening of the stock market today, but the main trend of prices continued upward. Erie Railroad issues were strengthened further by the prospects of better terms under the amended Nickel Plate merger plan and a moderate demand was in evidence for Southern Railway, "Katy" and other carrier stocks. General Motors and Air Reduction were heavy.

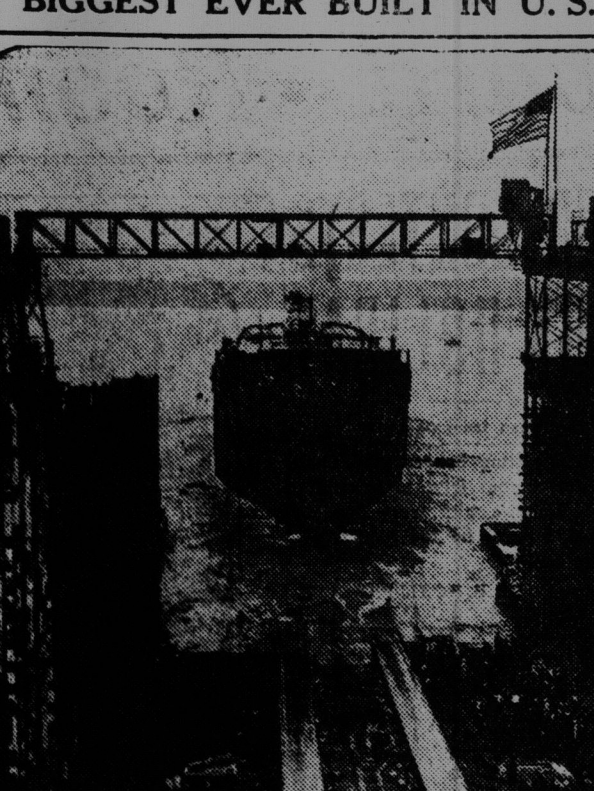

FRENCH FRANC HITS RECORD LOW LEVEL

Fate of Briand-Caillaux Cabinet
Regarded With Uncertainty

PARIS, July 2.—The fall in the franc yesterday to the new low level of 36.90 to the dollar, and the uncertainty in parliamentary circles regarding the fate of the Briand-Caillaux cabinet, when it faces the Chamber of Deputies, next Tuesday, are reflected in this morning's newspapers. There is a flood of adverse criticism of the government from the Right and Centre organs and even at the Anglo-Saxons, particularly the Americans from the Left.

He says that if a ministry of tomorrow refused to ratify the agreement so long as a safeguard was not incorporated in it, it would be carried away in a week by the sheer force of a fall in the currency.

NEXT SESSION OF TEACHERS' BODY TO BE HELD HERE

Attendance This Year, Total-
ing 816, Was Highest
on Record

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 2.—The final session of the thirty-first biennial meeting of the New Brunswick Teachers' Institute closed late Wednesday afternoon. The thirty-second biennial meeting is to take place in June of 1928 in Saint John, that city being selected next in the rotation of the three cities of the province. The total registration of delegates reached 816, the largest number ever recorded for a biennial institute.

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, principal of the Provincial Normal School, was selected as the representative of the Association on the Senate of the University of New Brunswick.

RESOLUTIONS.

Resolutions were passed as follows: Thanks to Fredericton School Board. Appreciation of Lord Beaverbrook's traveling scholarship plan.

Appreciation of Dr. George J. Oulton and ex-Supt. Amos O'Brien of Moncton, each over 40 years in service. Thanks to president, officer.

Dr. W. S. Carter introducing a paper on "The Inequality of Assessment" prepared by Dr. W. C. Kierstead of the U. N. B. faculty and read by R. B. Wallace, said that he expected the teachers to be all interested in their districts for assessment and tax reform.

PAPER ON TAXATION
The presentation of Dr. Kierstead's paper then took place. Dr. Kierstead referred to the decline of population and the fact that more than one-third of the population lived in urban areas. The periodic valuation for purposes of taxation was mentioned also.

On basis upon which valuation was made. Much information and statistics of importance were contained in the paper.

E. B. Wallace who had read the paper opened the discussion. He said that in no province of Canada or State of the Union was there a uniform system of valuation for assessment. All over the United States the theory had been accepted but had been hampered by the opposition of financial interests.

In the majority of states, as in New Brunswick, the heavier burden of school taxes fell upon the local district. Some states had state funds by which schools were supported. Recently there had been a tendency to acknowledge education as a state or national matter. In New Brunswick the time must come when assessment would be equalized.

One serious defect was the existence of so many weak school districts. Out of 1451 there had a valuation of \$3,000, 80 between \$3,000 and \$5,000, and soon with increasing valuation. The Poor District Fund and the County Fund substantially aided the weak districts.

PADANG, Sumatra, July 2.—Reports received here from the stricken town of Padang, destroyed by an earthquake, on Tuesday, indicate that at least 200 persons were killed. The devastated areas have not yet been searched thoroughly and there are many injured, whose hurts may prove fatal. The entire town, which collapsed with a thundering crash, is in ruins.

BIG FISH LANDED IN SAINT JOHN RIVER

Seventeen-pound Salmon Caught
Yesterday in Hart's Island Pool

FREDERICTON, July 2.—The salmon fishing at Hart's Island pool, in the Saint John river, a few miles west of Fredericton, according to present indications, will be very good this season. Raymond M. Currie, of this city, who holds the record for the pool, catching a 15-pound salmon in the same pool, landed a 17-pound fish Dominion Day after a battle of one hour. Later in the day he hooked another huge salmon which towed his canoe about a mile down stream. The fish did not come in sight but from his strength it is believed to be bigger than the 28-pounder.

Mr. Currie's struggle with this big Atlantic salmon is a reminder of the fight which the late Col. Tucker, M. P. of Saint John, had with a huge bass in the same waters some years ago.

Dr. A. L. Grow, of Fredericton, hooked a 15-pound salmon in the same pool Dominion Day and landed it. He left his home at three o'clock and was again at six o'clock with his trophy.
