

CALL PARENTS "COMRADE"

Ukrainian Children So Name
Parents as Result of Com-
munist Teaching.

Toronto, Aug. 2.—"The red menace hangs over the Ukrainian colonies in Canada. Conditions in the cities and villages cannot be described other than as perilous and a calamity to the progress of assimilating Ukrainians in the Canadian household." This is the way Rev. Paul Crath, Presbyterian missionary to the Ukrainians in Ontario, summed up his statements in an interview on the Ukrainian situation in Canada.

There are at present over half a million Ukrainians in the Dominion. In order of largest number of nationals they stand third, with Anglo-Saxon leading and French second.

Mr. Crath was asked whether in his opinion the Ukrainian people could be easily assimilated into the Canadian of Canada. "You have struck the question which has become the greatest calamity of our people," he answered. "The children assimilate too quickly. That very fact has been the cause of the present perilous situation which exists in our colonies. While the children were picking up the English language in a few months, the parents did not acquire a knowledge of English for many years. This has been the cause of parents losing contact with their children. They could not teach their children the moral and ethical precepts of our fathers, with a result so terrible that I am afraid when I think of it. Seventy-five per cent of the Ukrainian children leave home and are never heard from again. A large percentage also go astray," Mr. Crath stated.

"So great has this evil become in recent years that Ukrainian fathers and mothers have banded themselves together with the object of establishing Ukrainian language schools, where their children could learn their home language and so re-establish the lost contact between parents and children," he added. "The Bolsheviks have taken advantage of this situation. They have one basic idea, that if they get the children they will be sure of the next generation as supporters of the red doctrine," he continued. "The Communists have started four schools in Toronto and wherever in Canada you find Ukrainians there you find communist schools."

"When the Communists opened schools in Canada the parents who had for a long time been seeking an opportunity for their children to become acquainted with their mother tongue sent them to these schools."

"One of the first tasks of a Bolshevik teacher is to destroy all sense of religion in the child. He must prepare the way for gross materialism. That is why the first thing taught in these schools is that there is no God. In Toronto, where I am organizing a new Presbyterian church, there is one of these schools, the teachers of which have told the pupils that they do not need to obey their parents, and where the children come home and address the parents as 'Comrade Father,' and 'Comrade Mother.'"

THE WATER SUPPLY.

In a letter appealing for a sanitary East St. John, with a pure water supply, James A. Sheehan writes:—

"A single case of typhoid, near enough to the bank of a reservoir to drain into it, can start a full-blown epidemic of several thousand cases, and has done so a score of times. But this is the danger to the urban half of our population. In rural districts far too much of our water is drawn from wells into which, house slops and barnyard drains. Hence the apparent paradox that typhoid is now chiefly a disease of the open, supposedly healthy, country, while the city typhoid rate for the entire year is September, just after people begin to troop reluctantly back to the weary grind, and consider the country which the city council too much to give our committee from East St. John a decided answer at the earliest possible date, so we can, if possible, use the ounce of prevention and save the ton of cure."

CONSULAR AGENT'S SON KIDNAPPED BY CUBANS

Bandits Demand \$20,000 From Youth's Father, American Representative at Sagua.

Sagua La Grande, Cuba, Aug. 2.—John Jova, Jr., 20-year-old son of the American Consular agent here, has been kidnapped and is being held for \$20,000 ransom, according to a note received by his father demanding the money. Young Jova was accompanied by six special agents when he was kidnapped at a road crossing. As soon as the kidnapping was reported police guards and six special agents were sent by Mayor Canut on the trail of the bandits. Another posse left for a large cave near here in the belief that young Jova might have been carried there.

Mayor Canut later notified the Provincial Governor and the Secretary of Interior at Havana of the kidnapping.

HAMILTON CLOSES THE PLAYGROUNDS

Other Regulations in Fighting Infantile Paralysis—More Deaths.

Hamilton, Ont., Aug. 2.—Drastic regulations have been decided on by the board of health in an attempt to check the spread of infantile paralysis here. Three deaths have occurred and there is a rapid increase in cases. The city playgrounds will be closed indefinitely. Closing of bathing beaches throughout the city is also being considered. The disease is contracted from discharges from the mouth and nostrils and can be easily contracted in water.

In co-operation with the health department, city officials announced last night that the city institutions picnic, would not be held on August 17, as arranged.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Six dead, nine seriously injured, and more than fifty badly bruised, was the toll of the wreck of a Chicago, Lebanon and Northern train yesterday, which was in collision with a negro Sunday school excursion train near Cincinnati.

Norbert Larive, a patient at St. Jean de Dieu hospital, Longue Point, an insane asylum near Montreal, was beaten to death by another inmate yesterday. The body was badly mutilated. Larive and his assailant occupied the same room, and the growing of the murdered man from sickness, was supposed to have upset his assailant. They fought silently and only when Larive dropped did the nurses on duty hear the noise.

Sydney Harbor is full of vessels anxious to load coal cargoes and the piers are working twenty-four hours a day at full speed. The Louisburg coal piers have been reopened to load bunker coal to leave Sydney free for coal carriers.

Horatio Bottomley, former editor of John Bull, who was recently convicted of several charges of converting to his own use about £100,000 subscribed to clubs, was yesterday expelled from the British House of Commons by a vote of the members.

The there need be no grave concern over the fuel situation in Canada as a result of the strike in the United States, was an announcement given out after a cabinet meeting at Ottawa last night. The coal problem has been under discussion by the government for the last two months. POISON IN PIE

Day of Tragedy in New York Restaurant

Six People Dead and Hundred or More Ill—Seek a Baker's Helper—Traces of Arsenic in Crust.

(Canadian Press.)
New York, Aug. 2.—Arsenic, mysteriously placed in a batch of pie dough, was responsible, yesterday, for the death of six persons and the illness of more than 100 who partook of poisoned pastry in the Shelburne restaurant on Monday. It was blackberry and huckleberry pie. Several of the 100 or more who were poisoned are still in a critical condition. The culinary history of the pie sold in the place was said by the district attorney last night still to be shrouded in mystery.

The crust of several pies taken from the restaurant by the authorities is said to have contained arsenic. After the receipt of a signed statement issued by M. P. Schlesinger, a chemist, that the "Gutzeit test" revealed clear traces of the poison, the board of health rescinded the operating permit of the restaurant. District Attorney Banton said his investigations had revealed that the dough supply was seldom used in one day's baking, but that some was left over for the following day. It was the duty of a particular baker's helper, the authorities said, to return this "stock" from the bakery to the restaurant ice box each day. This man, they said, was being sought for questioning in regard to the case.

BEADS FROM PALESTINE

Waste From Button Factories Put Into Many Novel Forms.

Waste from American button factories furnishes the major part of the raw material used in Bethlehem, Palestine, for the making of beads, rosaries, inlaid work, carving and miscellaneous ornaments. Though considered the centre of the mother of pearl industry, this Asiatic city imports from the United States twenty tons of refuse, broken pieces and butt ends of mother of pearl, which in various forms are sent to all parts of the world.

The long strings of pearls in the form of necklaces are not as important to the industry as are the rosaries. Considerable quantities of tiny beads are made and strung on string or in bunches to be used for various trimming purposes. These beads are also in demand for the larger carved pieces and other products requiring whole or nearly whole shells. FIGHT TICKET TRAPS MUSICIAN AS BURLGAR

Holder, Arrested, Reveals Seifer, in Atlantic City Room Is Much Booby.

Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 2.—A ticket for the Leonard-Tender fight in Jersey City, Thursday night, led to the arrest of Harry Fleming, twenty-two, of this city, charged with burglary and theft of several thousand dollars' worth of jewelry. The police say the arrest will clear up several robberies reported during the last two weeks.

Fleming was taken into custody at a hotel in North Illinois avenue. Detectives recovered a collection of jewelry, including diamonds, watches, bags, pins, brooches, rings and other valuable articles, in his room. Four persons so far have identified part of the loot.

Herbert Smiley and his brother, Harry, who live at 122 South Massachusetts avenue, and informed the detective bureau a few days ago of a burglary at their home, said the thief had taken a ticket to the fight. A man with the ticket was arrested at Jersey City.

The holder of the ticket had purchased it from Fleming, he said, which led to the arrest of Fleming, who is a musician in a side avenue hotel. The man who purchased the ticket was released on his own recognizance and will be called as a witness when Fleming is arraigned.

MORE WOMEN OFFENDERS.

Bedford Admissions Above Average in July—Fewer Prison Arrivals.

Bedford, N. Y., Aug. 2.—Major Amos T. Baker, superintendent of the State Reformatory for Women, announced that admissions of new prisoners for the month of July totaled twenty-five, which was above the average. The crime wave among women still continues, he said.

Bedford is doing a brisk business in new arrivals compared with Sing Sing Prison and other prisons and jails in the state, which all report a falling off in new admissions during the last two months.

TRAINMEN SAVE MAN FIGHTING ANGRY BULL

Stop Passing Train and Rescue Iowan, Battling for Life in Field.

Waterloo, Iowa, Aug. 2.—Fred Bartled was rescued from an infuriated bull by an Illinois Central freight train crew near Manchester.

Bartled was passing through a field when attacked by the bull and was exhausted when trainmen stopped a passing train and rushed to his assistance.

BELGIAN GOVERNMENT TOO POOR TO TAKE PART IN EXHIBITION

Brussels, Aug. 2.—The depleted state of the public treasury prevents the Belgian government's official participation in the international exhibitions planned for Belgium in the next ten years.

The decision affects the International Steel and Iron Products Exposition, to be held at Ghent in 1928; the Electrical Exposition of 1923, to be held in Brussels, and the World's Fair, also to be held in Brussels in 1930. The last mentioned will commemorate the 100th anniversary of Belgium's independence.

GUARD RAIL GONE, BLIND WOMAN WALKS OFF ROOF TO HER DEATH

New York, Aug. 2.—Because she did not know that a guard rail on which she was accustomed to depend had been removed from around the roof of the four story tenement at 91 Vandam street, Anna Nungesser, thirty-four, a blind woman, walked off the edge of the roof and was killed.

The woman lived on the top floor of the building with her sister and the latter's husband, Thomas J. Harrigan. After washing her hair yesterday morning she went up on the roof to let it dry. Somebody had removed the familiar guard rail without telling her.

Her brother-in-law saw her falling body flash by the window. Dr. Retherston from St. Vincent's Hospital pronounced the woman dead.
