Include \$1,250,000 for St. John Harbor

Government at Ottawa Faces Big Financial Problem—Cabinet Ministers May Be Directors of Private Corporations.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Ottawa, March 8.—Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, this afternoon tabled the main estimates for coming financial year amounting to \$582,062,698 compared with main estimates last year of \$607,149,428 and total estimates of \$615,395,411.

The following statement gives a bird's eye view of the main estimates comparing them with the total estimates voted for the previous year.

The Main Change

Under consolidated services the main decreases are as follows: Militia and defence \$264,907.78; public works, income \$2,388,471.81; mail subsidies and steamship subventions \$229,656.61; Royal Canadian Mounted Police \$1,146,485.82; soldiers' land settlement \$15,000,000; soldiers' civil re-establishment \$21,071,094.83; air board \$275,000; miscellaneous showing a total decrease of \$2,388,481.61; in last year's estimates under the latter head, however, additional monies were provided for the commutation of the pensions payable to those suffering slight disability. The decrease this year is entirely due to the fact that a much smaller vote is required for this purpose this year.

The main items of increase are: Trade and commerce, \$1,250,000, due to provision for the census; post office department, \$116,204.02; railways and canal collection of revenue, \$1,250,000 and railways and canal income \$22,060,460.89. Notwithstanding the large savings noted above, there is a total increase in consolidated services of \$22,452,293.04 due to the railway appropriation. Capital vote shows a reduction of \$22,059,988.46. There is a decrease of \$11,610,000 in the marine department due to the railway appropriation and a reduction of \$11,212,850.00 for railway equipment and \$2,458,830 for construction and betterments of Canadian Government Railways.

An appropriation of \$7,777,380.00 is made for demobilisation expenditure. This is a reduction of \$22,455,720 on last year, and represents the amount which is required to clean up Canada's war outlay.

be spent on the parliament buildings during the coming year, \$1,800,000 for a new dry dock at Esquimaux, \$1,250,000 for improvements to St. John harbor and \$1,000,000 for Toronto harbor improvements, as well as \$175,000 for breakwater protection at Toronto Island. In New Brunswick the public works department proposes to spend \$86,500 and \$75,000 of it will be for new buildings, repairs and improvements to the quarantine station on Partridge Island and in St. John harbor. Of \$102,100 to be spent for harbors and rivers in New Brunswick generally, the largest items include \$6,500 for repairs to the breakwater pier at Cape Bald, Westmorland county; \$14,000 for a wharf at Lord's Cove, Deer Island; \$29,800 for reconstruction breakwaters at Gasco (St. Martins) and \$7,700 for repairs to the wharf at St. Andrews. Dredging in the maritime provinces will come to \$300,000. There are estimates of \$122,000 for an international bridge across the St. John river at Edmundston (N. B.), the state of Maine to contribute a like amount and a small amount of \$2,800 to repair the international bridge at St. Leonard's. Printing costs in all departments are less. One item asks for the administration of the business profits war tax act and the income war tax act. This is taken by some as meaning that the business profits tax may possibly continue. The new estimates tabled today show an amazing state of affairs. Before the government begins to live, that is, to carry on the affairs of the country, it must get revenue enough to pay \$14,800,127.20 for interest and sinking fund on the public debt of Canada and another \$108,987,638 for the railways now owned by Canada.

Ottawa, March 8.—By a majority of fifty-one the house of commons today declared in favor of cabinet ministers being allowed to sit as directors of private corporations. The division which came after a somewhat lengthy discussion of a bill introduced by A. R. McMaster, Liberal member for Bromo, as a private member, failed to receive unanimous support from the Liberal opposition, split the Progressives into two sections, and met with the solid opposition of the government supporters in the chamber. The chief Liberal whip, J. A. Robb (Hastingsburg-Huntington) opposed the bill on the ground that it would have a bad effect.

Third reading was given to the bill to amend the exchequer court act. Discussion on second reading of a bill to de-fine Canadian National was continued. A resolution by B. McCoin, Kent, favoring standardization of parts of agricultural machinery was referred, after discussion, to the committee on agriculture. F. H. Keeler, Port Arthur and Kenora, moved appointment of a special committee of the house to investigate the benefits of a deep waterway from the

Great Lakes by way of the St. Lawrence to the sea. In the senate consideration of a government bill creating a control board for the Lake of the Woods levels was postponed.

The Women's Auxiliary of Trinity church, in the sessions of its eighteenth annual meeting yesterday listened with much pleasure and appreciation to the address delivered by the rector, Rev. Canon R.
