### WOULD BANKRUPT THE RAILROADS

Higher Wages Means No Dividends—Pennsylvania President Says Companies Are in a Bad Way  
New York, July 26—J. G. Stuart, vice president of the Erie railroad, who was the principal witness at the morning session of the arbitration committee considering the demand of engineers of eastern railways, said that the railroad and the engineers might be classed as parties of the second and third part in the controversy. "The party of the first part," he added, "is the general public, for it is the public who pays the freight. It seems a simple matter to advance wages and then put up rates to cover the advance, but that is where the public comes in. Through their representatives, the Interstate Commerce Commission, and the various state commissions, the public has assumed jurisdiction over rates and recent decisions have shown that no advance in rates may be expected." Mr. Stuart said the effect of the new wage schedule, if allowed and if collateral advances to other employees followed, would result in the Erie, the New York, Susquehanna & Western, and the New Jersey & New York railroads being unable to pay their fixed charges. This, he said, would result in bankruptcy.

### President's Plan

James McCreary, president of the Pennsylvania railroad, was today called as a final witness at the arbitration committee. He was called to give his opinion on the plan for a carefully prepared opinion by the members of the board, setting forth their reasons for whatever award they decided to make. He said the entire country is expecting the commission to treat fairly the situation as a whole.

### Mr. McCrea continued:

"The railroads are in this position: Their rates are controlled by government regulation. The rates are at a standstill, but are being constantly reduced. The fixed expenditures in the way of taxes, special provisions made by special legislation, whether calling for the maintenance and comfort of the public or what they deem right, are constantly increasing and are burdens over which they have no control. I do not complain of any of them, but at the same time with your sources of income controlled, and many of your expenditures likewise being controlled, the question of additional cost of labor is a most serious one."
