## Tunisian in Port

The Allan liner Tunisian, Captain J. A. Fairfull, from Liverpool via Haifa, arrived in port Saturday with 362 passengers. The steamer left Haifa at 1.20 p. m. Friday afternoon and arrived off the island Saturday afternoon at 1.40, coming up to her dock at No. 4 berth, Sand Point, at 5 o'clock in the evening.

The Tunisian brought out 712 passengers to Halifax, leaving there 229, as follows: Twenty saloon, forty second cabin and 199 steerage. Of the 262 landed here thirteen were saloon, seventy-four second cabin and 225 steerage. Forty-five of the newcomers were for the United States and the Canadian or American immigration officials. Among the passengers was A. H. Hamilton, N. C., who had been in England on legal business. The Tunisian had a good sized cargo.

New York, Nov. 27. The White Star liner Celtic, arriving today from Liverpool via Queenstown, had a tempestuous passage. On Friday, during a storm, her wireless apparatus broke down, and she was carried away, cutting off all communication with shore as the vessel neared port.

NO CONTESTS FOR  
MANY BRITISH SEATSLloyd George Again Attacks the  
Lords—Trouble Follows Meeting in Cork—Balfour's Manifesto

London, Nov. 27.—At present the Liberals are not contesting sixty-one seats, the most whereof are home counties. The Unionists are not fighting in thirty-eight. There were twenty-three, three-cornered fights as against forty-nine, there are fifty-seven Liberal candidates, against twenty-eight in January.

The Redoubtable held a big meeting in Cork tonight. Afterwards they endeavored to march in procession through the O'Rourke quarter. The police intervened.

Lloyd George, the stormy center for the night, addressed several meetings in Edinburgh Saturday. He again attacked the lords with vigor, which will earn him additional titles to those he already possesses, such as "Lionheart," "Mile-end," "Mole-monger," "Specialist in O'Hall," "He denied the Liberal policy was revolutionary. Even the members for Wales, the most radical portion of the kingdom, had no interest in overturning British institutions or assailing property. He declared the brilliance and sunshine of the people's lives so blinded them to the squall around them that they could not legislate because they lacked the sympathy necessary to such legislation.

F. P. O'Connor, in London, stated that the Tories could get a subscription from Laurier for tariff reform there would be nothing heard about "American Dollars." The opposition expect to win half a dozen seats in London and are looking with hope rather than confidence in Lancaster.

The stock exchange wavered shows the opinion of brokers on Radical chance is declining.

London, Nov. 27.—The election address of Arthur J. Balfour, leader of the opposition in the house of commons, is a brief document. It declares that the Unionist programme of legislation is practically the same as at the general election, and asserts that behind the single chamber conspiracy lurks Socialism and home rule.

"It is because both Nationalists and Socialists are aware that their darling projects are not in harmony with the contented will of the people," says Mr. Balfour, "that they press for the abolition of the only constitutional safeguard which at critical moments will enable that will to prevail."

The opposition leader also alludes with the greatest brevity to the alternative scheme for the reform of the house of lords which Lord Lansdowne proposed.
