DAMASCUS MOB THREATENS BALFOUR

1,000 NATIVES ATTACK HOTEL WITH STONES

Driven Off by Cavalry and Smoke Bombs from Airplanes

HEER FLEES TO FRENCH VESSEL AT BEIRUT

Evacuation Was Grave for Time, Says London Correspondent There.

British United Press. LONDON, April 11.—Lord Balfour was seriously threatened at Damascus when a mob of thousands attacked the hotel and drove him back into a combined attack of cavalry, aeroplanes, police and armoured cars, according to the Damascus correspondent of the London Times, who emphasizes the menacing nature of the situation in the city. Lord Balfour was hurried to Beirut and boarded a French ship.

6,000 IN MOB.

"The previous demonstration before Lord Balfour's hotel was bad enough, but the rioting that broke out in the morning resulted in the most serious consequences as the vast crowd of 6,000 natives, who had been harried by agitators outside the hotel, stormed down the street and set fire to the hotel."

CAVALRY QUELLED.

"The struggle lasted until 2 o'clock when cavalry arrived. The cavalry charged and using the flats of their swords, drove the mob back, while aeroplanes overhead dropped smoke bombs."

SHIP SAILS WITH NO EMIR.

NEW YORK, April 10.—The Red Sea liner Zealand, sailed yesterday for Beirut, carrying Lord Balfour and his family, and a number of other British officials. The ship was escorted by the French fleet.

KAROYLI SEES RESTORATION OF HAPSBURG WAR MENACE

Hungarian Nobleman and ex-Premier Says Bucharest Regime Works for Austrian Empire Revival With Imperialistic German Alliance

WIFE DENIES COUNT AIDS BOLSHEVIKS

Washington Gossip Repudiated; Ascribed to Horthy Government's Agents; Programme Outlined; He is Recalled as Premier of Native Land

COUNT MICHAEL KAROYLI, former premier and president of Hungary, warning against the peril of a war that might involve all Europe and declaring that the present regime in Hungary was working towards the restoration of the Hapsburg dynasty and the Austro-Hungarian Empire with a view to eventual alliance with an imperialistic Germany and the formation of a Mittel Europa group of nations bent on world conquest, made several statements here yesterday for Liverpool.

Countess Catherine Karolyi, his wife, who accompanied him to this continent, accompanied him and yesterday gave, for the first time, the reasons why her husband had been forced to promise silence on political questions by the United States during his stay in that country.

HUNGARY FEARS COUNT.

He declared that the Hungarian Government, through the medium of Count Laszlo Sechenyi and his wife, formerly Mrs. Gladys Vanderbilt, had been behind the attempt to keep them out of the country. This had been done because the Hungarian Government feared the influence of her husband and the possibility of his return to power in his own country.

Count Karolyi offered a warning to the Government of the United States against the lending of money to the present Hungarian regime, declaring that those in power in his country were working towards a revival of the Mittel Europa idea pre-eminent in the minds of German and Austrian statesmen prior to and during the world war.

RESTORATION STEP.

He declared that their intention of re-establishing a monarchy in Hungary was just a step towards the restoration of the Dual Monarchy of Austria and Hungary.

ICE JAM BREAKS AT EDMUNDSTON

People, Driven From Homes by Rising River, Able to Return.

The ice jam in the St. John River below Edmundston broke on Thursday night and yesterday the ice bridge on the Miramichi River at Newcastle gave way. Some ice was still holding about a mile above Grand Falls last night and the river there was very little but at Edmundston the breaking up of the jam relieved conditions, which had been causing considerable alarm.

ONTARIO CHURCH UNION BILL PASSES

4.4 Per Cent. Beer Measure Also Passes Legislature Amongst 80 Others.

TORONTO, April 10.—The Ontario Legislature, sitting until 1.40 o'clock this morning, concluded its business sessions and the formal proclamation will take place on Tuesday next. Sitting from 11 a.m. yesterday, nearly eighty bills were disposed of, including the 4.4 per cent. beer measure, the Ontario Church Union Bill, and the redistribution bill.

TO EDUCATE MEXICO.

MEXICO CITY, April 11.—President Calles is planning an extensive educational programme for Mexico. He plans to use the radio for daily broadcasts of school lessons.

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MEIGHEN ASSURED TORONTO SUPPORT

Conservative Associations Are Ready For Election at Any Time.

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"I have no further information as to the events which have led up to his resignation, but I unhesitatingly deny the allegation that control of the Dominion association is passing into the hands of the Northwestern Mutual Fire Association. I deny also that there has been any departure from the original ideals.
