Governor And Lady Davidson's Visit

Arrangements have been made for His Excellency and Lady Davidson to pay a visit to Bay Roberts Saturday morning, Nov. 14th. The following is the programme:

Their Excellencies will arrive from Carbonear in their private car Saturday morning at 8.45. They will be met at the station by the Justices of the Peace and a committee from the Patriotic Association. The Governor, accompanied by these gentlemen, will view the Western Union cable station, staff house and other buildings of interest. Lady Davidson will meantime drive to Spaniard's Bay and address the women of that town.

At 11 o'clock Governor Davidson will deliver a Lecture on The Causes and Progress of the Great War in the new Public Building, Bay Roberts. The admission will be free, and everybody is cordially invited to be present.

At the same hour in the Empire Hall, opposite the Bank of Nova Scotia, Lady Davidson will address the members of the Women's Patriotic Association.

After the lecture Governor and Lady Davidson will take lunch with Rev. G. H. and Mrs. Field at the Rectory. In the afternoon they will drive to Brigus, where the Governor will again deliver his lecture. A stop will be made at Clarke's Beach en route to Brigus to enable Lady Davidson to meet the women of that town.

All the loyal men and women who possibly can should make a special effort to attend these meetings.

S. S. "Franconia" Takes 303 Naval Reservists

Thursday night, Nov. 5th, the large Cunard liner S. S. Franconia, over 18,000 tons, said to be the biggest ship that ever entered St. John's, arrived at St. John's to take a contingent of Naval Reservists to the Old Country. She sailed again at 8 o'clock Friday morning after taking aboard 303 of our sailors who volunteered for active service in His Majesty's Royal Navy.

Capt. Alan Goodridge went along in charge of the contingent. Large numbers of the citizens of St. John's viewed the ship as she sailed, and every steamer along the waterfront whistled a farewell. Guns were fired by many people from the houses at each side of the Narrows, and the Reservists aboard cheered heartily as the ship went through the Narrows.

The Franconia is 600 ft. 3 inches long, 71 ft. 3 inches wide, and 40 ft. deep. She has 40,100 horse power, and her speed is 20 knots.

Notes on the War

The battle reported to have taken place off the Chilean coast has been confirmed. Five German ships attacked four British. One of the British ships was sunk and the other is reported beached.

The German cruiser Emden, which was doing so much damage in the Indian Ocean, having sunk 22 steamers valued, with their cargoes, at \$4,000,000, was put out of business by the Australian warship Sydney. Several of her crew were killed and wounded, and the remainder, including the captain, were taken prisoners.

Tsingtau, the German possession in China, has surrendered to the British and Japanese forces. This will release a number of men and vessels for service in rounding up the seven or eight German warships still at large.

H. M. S. Chatham has got the German warship Koenigsberg bottled up in a river in German East Africa.

The Japanese army may be fighting in Europe before long.

The British torpedo gun boat Niger has been torpedoed by a submarine near the Goodwin Sands, off Deal, England.

The rebels of South Africa have been given until Nov. 21st to surrender.

The British force of 1,186,000 men have been virtually recruited. Severe fighting has taken place on the French-Belgium frontier lately. The Allies lost some ground in one place and gained in another.

The Russians are continually on the offensive, and have made much progress, capturing many prisoners and guns. They are now well in on German territory.

Proclamation

By His Excellency Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. W. E. Davidson, Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

YOUR KING AND COUNTRY NEED YOU. WILL YOU ANSWER YOUR COUNTRY'S CALL?

A Proclamation was issued on the 21st of August calling on the Patriotic young men of Newfoundland to enlist in the First Newfoundland Regiment and rally round the Old Flag. The response to the appeal was prompt and our Contingent, 540 strong, is already training in England and will be sent to the front as soon as the men are made thoroughly efficient.

We need more fighting men. We need to train more men to strengthen our Contingent for land service and we need to raise a Contingent for Sea Service, but the special need now is for men-o-war.

There is at present a force, nominally, of 600 men recruited from the Royal Naval Reserve. When the War broke out the roll was 525. A message was sent to the King that this force would be raised to 1,000 men, hardy and bandy and loyal men from the shores of Newfoundland. And the King has just now accepted the spirited offer.

The fishermen have been a vanguard on their summer voyage and will have waited for the return of the men to acquaint them of the King's acceptance of our offer. At the present moment the Reserve numbers only 550 men of whom 107 are already serving on board H. M. S. "Niobe."

The Lords of the Admiralty have now telegraphed that they are now ready to take over the Newfoundland and Reserve. So it is our duty to respond as soon as possible and arrange for their training.

The fishermen and landmen have responded nobly to the call and we have sent one Soldier Regiment from all the Districts. It is now the Seamen's turn. Let us not fail the Old Country in the great struggle for liberty on which she is now engaged. Newfoundlanders of old have been known for centuries to be staunch and true and loyal to the King. It must never be said that the descendants of the old Sea dogs, whose Fathers never failed when a blow had to be struck for Empire and for Right, are now absent when the Call is made.

The Admiralty call for 500 seamen from Newfoundland, to engage for the period of one year. Let the best of the men of the Country come forward and report themselves on board H.M.S. "Calypso."

Brief News

We met with a man recently who in all sincerity refused to give anything to the Patriotic Fund because he thought half the money would be taken and given to our schools and school-teachers. We explained matters to him and he gave willingly.

We are pleased to find that the old British spirit, so dominant in their forbears, still exist in our young men who are joining the Naval Reserve. Those whom we have been talking with belonging to this section have exhibited a strong desire to fight for their King and Country, and we have no doubt but that they will give a good account of themselves.

During recent battles in East Prussia Germans lost 70 per cent. of their officers, and from Oct. 23rd to Nov. 5th 323 German officers and 21,750 soldiers were taken prisoners, and 4 siege mortars, 52 cannon, 50 Maxim guns and large quantity war stuffs and provisions were taken.

Two fishermen, Joseph Cassel and Joseph Richmond, of Herriag Neck, while going in a boat to Milner's Arm for wood, was found dead by Thos. Cutler on Boyce's Island. Their boat must have struck a rock and filled with water. Cassel was found in the bottom of the boat, which was full of water, and Richmond was found in a bunch of trees.
