POLICE ITEM.—On Wednesday morning Joseph Butler was brought before Police Magistrate Blair charged with being drunk and disorderly on the 6th inst. and fined \$5.00 and costs or 1 month in jail. On a second charge of assaulting the Police on the same date, he was fined \$20 and costs or 2 months, and committed to jail for non-payment.

On the evening of Tuesday, 29th inst., at 8 o'clock, a missionary meeting will be held in St. James' Hall, when an address will be delivered by Rev. E. McCurdy, member of Foreign Mission.

Rev. Dr. Robert Jardine, formerly a Professor in the New Brunswick University and for several years a resident of Calcutta, India, in connection with the Presbyterian Church here, has been voted a special Thanksgiving Service by the congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Chatham. The matter will be considered by the Presbytery at its meeting here on Tuesday next.

THANKSGIVING.—The Annual Harvest Thanksgiving Service were held in St. Mary's and St. Paul's Churches on Sunday last. The authorized bountiful and appropriate special Thanksgiving Service was used, and the offerings which amounted to \$25, were in aid of the Diocesan Church Society. St. Mary's Chapel was tastefully decorated with autumn leaves,

fruits and flowers, testifying to the bountiful attributes of the Lord of the harvest, and to the zeal and energy of ladies and gentlemen in the congregation and kind friends who gave their aid.

FINE DOINGS.—The Bathurst correspondent of the *Sun* says:—"Four of those gentry who style themselves *Commercial Travellers*, but who are usually designated by the less dignified title of 'bummers,' were the perpetrators of the only piece of downright rowdiness inflicted on this town during the whole summer. They broke into the Wilbur House sample room on Monday night, kicked the door all to pieces, broke the shutters, smashed windows and lamps, and did all the damage they could. In the morning the street, for rods up and down, was littered with glass, broken samples of hardware, beaver hats, etc."

DRAMATIC.—The Edwin Byron Dramatic Company played in the Masonic Hall, Chatham, on Saturday, Monday and Tuesday evenings. "A Celebrated Case" was the piece of the opening night, Mr. Byron appearing as "Jean Renaud," Mr. T. P. Dunn as "Sergeant O'Rourke," Mr. P. E. Leach as "Lazare" and "Count De Morney," Miss Alice Gray as "Constance De Anbrette," Miss May Hammett as "Madeline" and "Adrianne" with the other parts in good hands. Mr. Byron has much power, as a tragedian and the rendition of his part was noticeable for its excellent points. Mr. T. P. Dunn also sustained the character of O'Rourke thoroughly, the remainder of the support being good. "The Two Orphans" and "Our Boys" were presented on the other two nights, followed by funny farces. The company appears in Newcastle to-night.

HEAVY LOSS.—On Saturday forenoon last, while Mr. John Falconer, whose farm is a short distance below Douglas farm, was engaged in his potato field, he observed that his barn was on fire. He and others hastened to it and found that it was impossible to save the building, so they turned their attention to the contents and succeeded in saving a good many farm implements etc. About 40 tons of hay, 300 bushels oats, and other valuable property, besides the building, were consumed, so that Mr. Falconer's loss cannot be much short of \$1000. Two children, sons of Mr. Falconer, were, we learn, playing with matches in the barn and caused the conflagration. The insurance on the property expired only a few days ago and Mr. F. having lost a fine horse, delayed re-insuring as he desired to use his ready money to replace the loss. He has a large stock of cattle and his case is really one deserving the substantial sympathy of his neighbors and friends.

NEW SCHOOL BUILDING.—The new school building on Wellington Street is one that reflects credit on the Trustees of District No. 9, whose Ratepayers have provided well for the comfort and convenience of their children. We have before referred to the structure but it is now about complete and an additional notice of it will be in place. It is two stories high and 66x26ft. with wings on each end 12x12. The lower story is 12 feet in the clear and the upper, 10 feet. There are four large classrooms, each 25x25 ft.—two on the first and two on the second floor and six cloak rooms, two above and four below. The stairs leading to the upper portion of the building are situated in the wings. The design and plans of the building were by Mr. Alex. Cormack. Mr. Patrick Troy, one of our most enterprising and competent builders was the contractor for the whole work, which he has performed in a satisfactory manner. The time at which the work was to be finished under his contract was 1st November and notwithstanding it was the busiest part of the season, when it was hard to get dimensional lumber, Mr. Troy has finished his contract inside of the stipulated time—a rare experience for persons building. The masonry was done by Mr. J. Forrest, the plastering by Mr. John Crosby and the interior painting by Mr. D. Emerson and the outside painting by Mr. E. Morris.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.—The Municipal Elections are to be held on Tuesday next and from appearances they promise to be accompanied with very little excitement. In Chatham Parish we presume the present members, County Wardens Taylor and John Fotheringham, Esq., will be returned.

In Newcastle we are informed that Councillor Park has signified his intention of retiring. Among the candidates is Thomas Troy, Esq., a most eligible man who, with doubtless, secure his election. Councillor Bourne is also in the field, with good chances for re-election.

Councillors Somers and Brown will offer for re-election in Northwick, we are informed. It is thought there will be no contest in this parish unless ex-councillor Whitely should decide to again try conclusions with Coun. Brown.

Since the above was in type Mr. Whitely and Mr. Anthony Adams have entered the field.

Whitely will probably re-elect A. K. McDougall, Esq., and select Squire Johnston as his associate.

Jeremiah Sullivan, Esq., will seek re-election in Hardwick, and Mr. Danl' Lewis is also announced as being in the field. We have not heard whether Mr. Fowle will seek re-election of good prior for loss, but when this tax of 80c. per thousand superficial feet, which now exists is put on, together with the boomage of 40 and 47 1/2 cts., these two items, taken off the \$5.00 logs, reduces them to \$3.75, which does not begin to pay what labor and supplies are paid for, and it is impossible, at present, for any small lumber operator to bring a quantity of logs to market without making a debt which either the operator or the Merchant supplying him must lose.

A loss under this tax cannot be recovered at a legal price, but at this rate in the present state of the market, it is impossible for the merchant shipping to make a profit. The fact is that the lumber is being sacrificed, as we cannot compete in our principal markets, with the cheap lumber that comes from the Baltic. It may be said, under these circumstances it is better to retain the 80c., per thousand as this much will remain with us. That may be wisdom on the part of the Government to get the money in the public chest, but it remains as the value of the logs, putting the frogs with stones, what was play to the boys was death to the frogs. The large stumpage revenue, which was retained in our midst, is now taken directly out of the pocket of the producer and in this County, is a serious loss. Unless something is done to remove this tax, or at all events, reduce it to a nominal figure, our lumbering interests will soon become paralyzed, as the chances now of handy logs are becoming very scarce. Lumber near the streams is nearly cut away and hauls are from long distances, making the cost of procuring logs much dearer than before.

To show that the Government expected resistance in some shape to this unjust tax we might say that previous to its imposition, they sent agents to explore and report on the best localities and lumber districts in the County. These were not, and were made with some strong motives parties outside in the interests of the Government, giving them the complete privilege of buying these lands in their own apparent right, so that should applicants from this side of the Province refuse to buy in the lands under the stumpage arrangement, these outside parties would buy them, and thus compel our merchants to leave them from that act in increasing or larger stumpage than the Government asked. Our merchants on arriving at Fredericton were not long in finding out the situation, as some of those interested parties appeared on the scene on the day of the sale, ready to buy in all lots in that our agents required and they appeared quite capable of doing so, as they made a great display of their money, having large bundles of notes protruding from every pocket in their garments. When our merchants found that the imposition of the tax was determined on, they endeavored to get the Government to secure the lands they needed, and agree to pay the Government tax, in preference to the tax (imaginary or otherwise) that might be imposed by the combination referred to.

Now, let us look at the amount realized by the Government from this stumpage tax. We find from a reliable and detailed statement kindly furnished us, that for the three years it has been in operation 1875-7, the sum of \$92,000 has been raised in this County alone, the stumpage tax being from 60 cts. per 1000 sq. feet on logs, and 80 cts. on sawed lumber. This amount does not take in the further sum of \$2,900 which was also realized on bark, birch and pine timber and other lumber, which makes a total of \$94,900 for those years. We submit a statement of the amount realized for the year 1877, ending 31st of October, for the County of Northumberland, viz:—

The above amount, \$97,479.63, sends the tax on 62,498,000 sq. ft. of logs at 60 cts. per 1000, which was the tax for 1877, but in this year, 1878, the tax has been raised to 80c., and at this figure the same quantity of logs will net the Government \$69,972.54, less expenses of collection. The advance of the stumpage in 1878 has been 30%, and we have heard it mooted that it may be raised to \$1.00. Let us observe a coincidence in this amount of 80c.: Parties shipping deals from this port consider that if they can realize, by selling, the difference of the currency; that is, convert the currency into sterling, after paying cost and expenses, they sell at a good profit, which means a profit of 20%, and this is exactly the 80c., which if taken from the seller or the producer destroys this profit. Thus, if we have a log of 1000 sq. ft. sup. feet were added to the sixty-two millions for which this County paid stumpage in 1877, we would have paid half the tax on all the logs manufactured in this Province, on which the Government claimed the tax.

In view of the above facts, we think it the duty of every merchant, lumberman, and every one interested, to remonstrate with the Government to have this unjust tax removed, and devise some measure equitable and fair to the taxpayer, or reduce it to a nominal figure, so that this industry, in the County, may be prosecuted without loss. We hope that every reader of the *Advance* will ponder over the matter and ventilate it freely and widely, so that it may be pressed before the notice of our representatives and especially of our member who now occupies and was lately elected to a seat in the present session of the Legislature.

Having pondered over the matter, and the matter is directly under his own jurisdiction, and if he has patriotism for his country and regard for his constituents, he has now an excellent opportunity to render them a service in return for the support and favor they have lavished upon him by making the reduction or removal of this tax his aim.

As we may have more to say on this subject at another time, we close for the present.
