### THE HARVESTERS.

The Winnipeg Free Press denies the statement that it is difficult for harvesters to obtain work. It says in its lines in particular farmers are clamoring for more help and that the excursionists do not take the trouble to go where work is to be had. A Winnipeg doctor informed the Free Press that on Monday of last week he travelled eighty miles on an excursion train, and that scarcely a man got off at the stations to seek work. He fur-ther stated that the men seemed determined to get two dollars a day or sixty dollars a month, which the farmers maintain was too high a figure. Some who were on that train, however, were hired at fifty dollars per month. This gentleman suggested that if the C. P. R. would send the men out on special trains stopping a little longer at each station than the regular trains do, and if arrangements were made for farmers to be on hand there would be nuch less difficulty in arranging erms of engagement to the mutual satisfaction of farmers and harvest

FAST ATLANTIC SERVICE.

as informed the Ottawa correspondgotiations are now proceeding between Ottawa and London concerning the subsidy which the imperial govern-ment is expected to contribute to the fast Atlantic steamship service. Witness correspondent says that pressure is being brought to bear from London upon the Canadian govern-ment to provide a fast Atlantic service without further delay. The present Canadian government has learned what the conservatives long ago assured them they would learn, that more advantageous trade relations with the United States are not to be had for the mere asking. Our neighbors want the best of the bargain, and whether a liberal or consessative government is in power in Canada that policy will be pursued.

Vancouver is having trouble with its salmon fisheries. A short time ago the strike among the fishermen made things interesting, but that has all blown over. The people are now worried over the tremendous run of fish, At English Bay, the favorite beach near the city, the bathing is being spoiled by the stench from dead fish, and at Steveston the surplus quantities are becoming disagreeably conspicuous.
