FIFTEEN I. C. R. VETERANS DECORATED TODAY WITH IMPERIAL SERVICE MEDALS

Supt. Halliday Made the Presentation in an Appropriate Address—Large Number of Citizens Present—The List of Recipients.

Business was suspended in the Union Depot this morning in honor of the veterans of the service, while J. T. Halliday, District Superintendent of the Intercolonial Railway, presented Imperial service medals to a large number of the former employees who have retired after twenty-five or more years of active service.

The presentations were made in the gentlemen's waiting room in the presence of a large number of railway officials, and also a number of friends and relatives of those who were honored. Among those present was S. L. Shannon, comptroller of the road. The ceremony was an impressive one, while the fifteen white haired men who had given a life time to the service of the railway lined up to receive His Majesty's recognition of their long and faithful service. The veteran of the Veterans was Conductor Rennie, who after over forty-eight years of service is still hale and hearty. Special mention was made of his long term of employment.

In making the presentations, Mr. Halliday said:—"Long service medals have been granted to railway men during recent years, but this is the first time it has devolved on me to perform the ceremony. Medals have been given for brave deeds, for heroic acts, and for acts of self sacrifice. His Majesty, the King, in his wisdom, graciously included amongst those who deserve recognition the men who serve him in civil capacities. The railway service, to my mind, is not merely a service of labor. It entails devotion and includes sacrifice; since the life of the railway man is one of hazard."

"To have served a long period, such as you men have served, beginning during a time when railroading was practically in its infancy, and to have endured the hardships, and assayed the dangers should be worthy of public recognition, and I am pleased, as an humble subject of His Majesty to know that, in his provisions for reward, the older men in the Intercolonial Railway service have been included."

"The medal is entitled the 'Imperial Service Medal,' and is to be presented to those who have served a period of twenty-five years or more in the service of the crown, and have now retired; and it gives me the greatest pleasure to be appointed to bestow upon you, on behalf of the King and the Railway Department of Canada, this fine medal, which is in the form of a Star, hung from a ribbon, and enclosed in a handsome case. Each medal is duly engraved with the name of the honored one, with the date of the beginning of his service."

"I congratulate you heartily upon your long and faithful service, and hope you may be spared for many years yet."

REV. SCOVIL NEALES CHOSEN CATHEDRAL CANON

Popular Sussex Clergyman Appointed to Succeed Canon Montgomery Who Has Gone to Port Hope.

Bishop Richardson has appointed Rev. Scovil Neales, rector of Sussex, Canon of the Cathedral at Fredericton, in succession to Rev. Canon Montgomery, who has been removed to Port Hope, Ont. Canon Neales is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick in 1884, taking his M. A. degree two years later. For many years, rector of Gagetown, he was rector of the cathedral, and for nearly forty years rector of Woodstock, and Rev. Scovil Neales the subject of this sketch.

Canon Neales is one of the leading clergymen in New Brunswick and is a member of many important boards and committees. He was ordained by the late Bishop Medley in 1887, and during his ministry has been instrumental in the erection of five churches and the Medley Memorial Hall at Sussex. The appointment will be cordially approved by members of the Church at large.

JUDGMENT AGAINST WESLEY; CASE TO BE APPEALED

Judge Forbes Gives Decision for Half Plaintiff's Claim—The Prince Case Comes Up Tomorrow.

In County Court this morning argument in the case of Amusement, Limited, v. Fred. C. Wesley was heard. J. King Kelley argued on behalf of the defendant and W. H. Harrison for the plaintiff. At the conclusion of the argument His Honor gave judgment for one hundred dollars, the price of five shares. The action was brought by the Amusement, Limited, who are the managers of the Princess Theatre, against the defendant, Fred C. Wesley, who at one time was the President of the company. The action was to recover the price of ten shares which amounted to two hundred dollars and interest. At the trial the defendant's counsel offered to pay for five shares. His Honor, this morning gave a verdict for that amount. Mr. Kelley will officially apply for a stay of proceedings pending appeal.

The court then adjourned sine die. Tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock, under the Speedy Trials Act, the King v. Prince, for forgery, will be tried before Judge Forbes in Chambers. C. H. Ferguson, County Court Clerk, will appear for the Crown and W. Watson Allen for the prisoner.
