

Over Four Thousand Criminals Will Hereafter be Engaged on Public

ATLIANTA, Ga., March 31.—At midnight tonight the convict lease system comes to an end in Georgia, and tomorrow about 1,200 felony convicts will be transferred from the various privatet stockades throughout the state to the respective counties in which their crimes were committed. Together with about 3,000 misdemeanor convicts scattered throughout the state in jails and on county farms these men of stripes will be put to work on the public roads. The end of the lease systems and the transfer of the felony convicts from the privade stockades mean employment for about 1,500 free laborers in the various lumber mills, brick yards, and the like that hitherto have employed convict labor.
