GAMBLER WELL KNOWN HERE LEAVES WIFE AND DEBTS

"Doc" Mitchell, Formerly Prominent in St. John Bicycling Circles, Ships from Harlem with Girl, Leaving Wife Peniless and Host of Creditors.

The escapades of "Billy" Frank Mitchell, crack bicycle rider and manager of the Bramford Bicycle Company on King street in this city some ten or twelve years ago, will be still fresh in the memory of many citizens, especially those who were left lamenting when Mitchell skipped out leaving debts and a penniless wife to be provided for and eventually sent after him. Mitchell is again in the limelight this time in Harlem where for the last five years he has been keeping a gambling house. Accompanied by a beautiful young woman, who was clerk in a store near his gambling joint, "Doc" Mitchell, as he is now known, has once more disappeared under incredible circumstances. The pair are said to have sailed for Europe on the Mauretania and Mitchell's creditors and his wife are trying to figure out a scheme to stop him when he lands on the other side.

Prominent Figure. According to a story in the New York World, Mitchell has been a prominent figure in Harlem for the past five or six years. He was indicted for the same reason as the other gamblers, in which he covered not only Harlem but the roudhouse district of the Bronx and Westchester pretty thoroughly. Under the name of the "Independent League," he conducted a gambling house on the second floor of the building at No. 60 and 62 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street in partnership with a man named Hodson.

"Doc" Mitchell, as he was generally known, ceased attending to his gambling business some time ago. It was common gossip in the neighborhood that he was spending most of his time in the company of the pretty girl, the friend of the girl and the gambler and tried in vain to break it off. Not only did Mitchell neglect his business, but the business fell off. Within two weeks there were several bad rows in the gambling-house, and on Monday night Hodson was badly beaten by some visitors.

Girl Missing. After the row on Monday night Hodson tried to find Mitchell. The search was fruitless, not did any more success attend a quest on Tuesday. The news reached One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street Wednesday night that Mitchell had sailed on the Mauretania that morning. Then it was learned that the pretty little clerk to whom Mitchell had been paying attention had been missing since Monday night. The news that "Doc" Mitchell had "flamed"—as the sporting character

SUCCESSFUL SMOKER OF NORTH END CLUB

Temple of Honor Hall Packed to Doors by Conservatives - Dr. Daniel's Speech.

The North End Conservative Club held its first smoker last evening in the Temple of Honor hall on Main street and the large crowd which completely filled the hall heard a good programme of music and speeches. Among those who attended were Robert Maxwell, Dr. J. W. Daniel, Samuel Lewis, James E. Cowan, Miles E. Agar, Philip Grannan, Frank Hatheway, M. P. P., J. E. Wilson, M. P. P., W. G. G. A. O. Gibson, H. C. Green, Ald. N. P. McLeod, Ald. Wigmore, Charles M. Lingley, J. Starr Tait, and ex-Ald. Sproul. Letters regretting the impossibility of their attending were received from J. B. M. Baxter, H. A. Powell, F. R. Hazen, and the Hon. J. D. Hazen.

As Dr. Daniel entered the hall, the audience rose en masse and gave him three cheers and a tiger. President Chesley opened the proceedings by calling on Dr. Daniel for a speech. Dr. Daniel said that he was very glad to be present and that as the audience no doubt wished to hear the musical part of the programme, he addressed the Conservatives of the North End, the hall was filled with smoke, but with the smoke of battle and not that of pipes. He said that the victory of September 21st marked the wishes of the people and that he was sure the party would remain in power as they will carry out the policies that formed their platform prior to election day. He said further, that when he heard that Dr. Hazen had been selected for a portfolio in the new government he felt that it was his duty to give place to the Hon. J. D. Hazen that New Brunswick might be represented in the cabinet and that he was sure the new Minister of Marine and Fisheries, would prove to be one of the shining lights in the Borden cabinet.

Dr. Daniel in speaking of the new government said that it would preserve Canada's fiscal independence and the power to do with the tariff as the people wished. He then complimented President Chesley on the fine club that he had formed and closed his speech amid hearty applause.

The next speaker was W. Frank Hatheway, M. P. P. He spoke of the incidents of British valor in Egypt, Indian and Spanish wars, giving a good description of the Spanish Armada and of the bravery of a color sergeant in India during the Mutiny who, when tempted by the mutineers, who were approaching the thin red line disobeyed orders, leaving his place and killing the mutineers who offered him battle.
