SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, cultivation 60 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 60 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction on case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 40 acres may be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. In unreserved territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or sub-agent of Dominion Lands for the district, must in all cases be made, and the rental of one mile per annum. Royalty, 10 per cent. After the output exceeds \$10,000.

PLACING MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and from 1,000 to 2,000 feet wide. Entry fee, \$10. If more than \$100 must be expended in development work each year.

BREEDING—Two head of five miles each of a river may be leased to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 10 per cent. After the output exceeds \$10,000.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery of quartz veins, may lease a tract of land for mining purposes. Entry fee, \$10. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended to open and other requirements complied with, the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre.
