## Sporting News

THE TORONTO TEAM  
WON FIRST MATCH  
FROM CANADIENS

Five Thousand People Watch  
Terrific Game in Toronto—  
The Final Score Was Seven  
to Three.

Toronto, Ont., Mar. 11—After the  
greatest exhibition of professional  
hockey witnessed here in years, Tor-  
onto defeated the Canadians of Mon-  
treal by 7 to 3 tonight in the first of  
home and home games for the N. H. L.  
championship. The locals were always  
in front, leading 2 to 0 at the first in-  
terval and 3 to 1 at the second in-  
terval. But it was a battle royal  
from going to going. Five thousand  
people were present.  
Five minutes had elapsed when Tor-  
onto broke the ice. Randall rushed  
up right wing and shot. Harry Meek-  
ling was on hand and rapped in the re-  
bound, giving Veziina no chance to  
save.  
Cameron's rushing, which was a fea-  
ture of the game, was practically re-  
sponsible for the Toronto's second  
goal. He carried the rubber to the  
goal mouth, where he was tripped and  
led as he shot. Veziina stopped, but  
Randall recovered and scored as he  
fell over a bunch of players piled up  
in a heap at the goal.  
Canadiens made a bold stand at the  
beginning of the second stanza, and  
Lalonde repeatedly carried the play  
to Toronto's territory. His efforts  
were eventually rewarded, when he  
Holmes on a hard shot to the  
corner of the net from outside the de-  
fence.  
A moment later Meekling contributed  
the finest piece of stick-handling of the  
evening. He took a pass from Noble,  
wedged his way through a swarm of  
Red shirts close to the Canadian net,  
drew Veziina out and tallied.  
During the remainder of the period  
the pace never slackened.  
Both teams continually shooting  
substitutes into the game to give the  
regulars a much needed rest, but  
there was no further scoring.  
The crowd was on tiptoe cheering  
madly during the greater part of the  
concluding chapter. The goals were  
more numerous and many exciting in-  
cidents cropped up. Meekling opened  
the scoring on an individual effort,  
after five minutes had elapsed. Then  
Corbeau went to the visitors, when  
Corbeau got right in front and banged  
in a rebound from Lalonde's shot.  
Adams took a pass from Cameron  
and bulged the twine. Cameron fol-  
lowed with a beautiful individual rush  
from end to end and single-handedly  
beat Veziina for the next center.  
"Noble" Laidlaw opened the next  
center for the Red Shirts, on a pass  
from Hall, in short order. Mummery,  
single handed, tallied the last goal of  
the game for the Blue Shirts on a shot  
from well out.

The players exchanged wallop and  
continued tripping and cross-checking  
to the very end.  
With a four goal lead the Toronto  
feel confident of protecting their ad-  
vantage in the return game at Mon-  
treal on Wednesday and capturing the  
championship.
