CHIEF INSPECTOR WILSON ADDRESSES THE METHODISTS

Tells Them Government Is Not Interfering With Enforcement of Prohibition — Appeals To Members of Conference For Support of Local Inspectors—Prof. Knudson of Boston Preaches — Ministerial Changes.

Sackville, June 12.—One of the chief features of interest in connection with today's sessions of the Methodist Conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, now meeting in this town, was the visit of Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson who addressed the conference and was given a very hearty reception. Inspector Wilson is a man of honor of energy and resolution, pleasing in manner and approachable, and in the words of the president of the conference, who extended greetings, is "highly esteemed for his own sake and for the sake of the cause he represents."

When last he addressed the Methodist conference there were but six counties in New Brunswick which were under the provincial prohibitory law. Today practically the whole province is covered by the law. In the County of Westmorland the last to come under the provisions of the act the law came into effect yesterday.

If the conference concerned agree to the recommendations made these will be submitted to the general conference which meets in September in Hamilton, Ont. Most of the lay delegates have arrived in preparation for the general session which convenes in the morning.

This evening the first public service was held in the beautiful auditorium of the church when the Rev. Albert C. Knudson, D. D., professor of Boston University School of Theology, preached an eloquent sermon. It has been the custom of the conference to invite some distinguished expert to give a series of inspirational addresses during the conference session and Dr. Knudson worthily maintains the standard of former years. At the close of the preaching service the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered.
