FIRST CONVENTION OF MARITIME BAPTISTS

United Body Elected Rev. Mr. Hutchinson, of Truro, President

Hon. Mr. Emerson Resigns as Governor of Acadia College—Warm Discussion Over Location of Nova Scotia Technical School at Halifax—Reports of the Wolfville Institutions Show Them in a Prosperous Condition—Other Business of Saturday's Session.

Wolfville, N. S., Aug. 25.—The Maritime United Baptists' convention assembled in the audience room of the Baptist church yesterday morning to hold its first session as a united body. The convention opened with Dr. McLeod, of St. John, president, in the chair.

The officers for the year were chosen as follows: President—R. W. N. Hutchinson, Truro; Vice-President—Rev. C. T. Phillips, Jacksonville; Rev. G. A. Belyea, Bay View. Secretary—Rev. J. H. McDonald, Fredericton.

Assistant secretaries—Rev. A. J. Prosser, Rev. B. H. Thomas, Dorchester. Treasurer—Prof. J. F. Tufts, Wolfville. Editor of year book—Dr. H. C. Creed, Fredericton.

The following visiting brethren were invited to a seat in the convention: Rev. Dr. Keirstead, Rev. Dr. Boga, Dr. Hutchison, Rev. J. L. Miner, Rev. G. M. B. Balentine, Rev. O. L. Owens, New York. The pastors of the town, Rev. E. B. Moore, Rector R. H. Dixon, Rev. David Wright and Rev. J. B. Hemmon and the Rev. Dr. Martin, Salem.

The new president of Acadia College, Rev. Dr. Hutchinson, and Dr. Keirstead, were called to the platform to give short addresses.

Dr. Keirstead spoke briefly, thanking them for their cordial greetings and conveying to the convention the best wishes of the upper Canadian brethren and warmly commending the new president to the sympathies and love of the convention.

Acadia's New President. Dr. Hutchinson said it gave him great pleasure to meet so many of his brethren of the Baptist body and to revive old memories. He thanked them for the warm reception given him and felt a great debt of gratitude for the great opportunities he enjoyed here, while a student at Acadia. He thanked the Baptist denomination for the confidence reposed in him by calling him to the important office of college president. He had accepted it with humility, and a desire to give the best of himself to the work.

Rev. Mr. Manter, Free Baptist, from New York, expressed his great pleasure in meeting with the United Baptists and the Maritime Provinces. The same problem of union, which has been so happily settled here will come up for discussion next year and he hoped that it would be settled right. Union was in the air, and it must come.

The report of the treasurer of Acadia College in part is as follows: In 1885, the debts against the several departments amounted to \$66,475.97. The trust funds, not including the "J. W. Barnes Professorship," amounted to \$77,290.30. None of the buildings, except the seminary, had hot water heating and some of them were in a dilapidated condition and we owned but one piano. To date all our debts are paid except \$425, which is really an indirect liability. Our trust fund amounted to \$253,976.69 (not including the "J. W. Barnes Professorship"). Our buildings are equipped with hot water heating and other modern conveniences and are in a good state of repair, and we own 22 upright pianos and two grand pianos. During this time the main hall extension has been built at a cost of \$3,000 and the interior of the manual training building finished at an outlay of about \$700. For all this gain we should thank God and take courage.

The report of the governors of Acadia College was presented. It referred to the new professor and new president, had in these paragraphs on the academy and Acadia Seminary and on the Nova Scotia Technical College. The report said:

Technical School Report. "Your board have watched with much interest the establishment of a technical college by the government of Nova Scotia. As the bill, when first introduced, seemed very indefinite it was thought advisable to ask for a clear statement of the purpose for which the school was intended and also that the colleges now doing work of the first two years of the engineering course have a representation on the corporation, so that the school would be more likely to enlist the sympathy and ensure the co-operation of all the colleges if located in some other place than a university town in order that such co-operation might be given on fair and equal terms. The bill as finally passed provides that if existing colleges continue to give instruction in the first two years of the various branches of engineering, the technical college shall undertake the work of the last two years only, and provides representation on its corporation from colleges doing the work above indicated, but the design expressed in the bill, as originally passed, to locate the college in a university town, namely, in Halifax, has remained unchanged. Your board, therefore, while it is prepared to offer every assistance in making the proposed technical work successful, if allowed to do so on equitable terms, have not, under the circumstances, felt at liberty to appoint a representative on the corporation."

A Warm Discussion. A most exciting discussion took place on this clause, and strong opinions were expressed on both sides. Professor Haley deplored the action of the governors in declining to appoint a representative on the governing board of the technical school, and said that if the convention passed this clause in the report that other colleges in the provinces coming in would have an advantage over Acadia, and nothing could be gained in refusing to send a representative.

E. D. King defended the action of the governors and I. B. Oakes spoke against it and said that as a member of the board he had favored representation on the governing board of the technical school. Mr. Oakes, supported by Professor Haley, said that Premier Murray repeatedly affirmed that the location of the school in Halifax was not intended to favor any arts college, to the injury of another. Halifax was a natural centre. He made a strong plea for co-operation in this important matter.

STILL PROBING HARTLAND FIRE

Sign Erected on Burned Lot That Caused Some what of a Sensation

Hartland, N. B., Aug. 24.—This morning a surprise awaited the early pedestrians on Main street when a large wooden sign was found erected on the Tracy lot in the burnt district with these words: "SACRED TO THE MEMORY OF — who kindled the fire that laid here these lives and ruined a score of people, including widows and poor orphan children."

The sign remained in position, attracting the notice of people, until the man named took it down toward noon.

The fire inquiry was resumed today by Justice A. J. Macdonald, with M. L. Hayward, foreman, and several witnesses. Several witnesses were examined. The enquiry is postponed to some date not yet named. The end is not yet.

Aged Baptist Clergyman Dead.

Clinton, Mass., Aug. 24.—Charles W. Bowers, secretary of the Baptist State Association, and formerly for 39 years pastor of the Baptist church in this town, died tonight at his residence here at the age of 90 years. He was graduate of Brown University in the class of 1838. In 1860 and 1868 he was a member of the Massachusetts legislature.
