

missionary must endure much toil. This place long continued a barren desert, which caused the hands of those who laboured here to hang down with discouragement ; but at length the Lord visited it with the outpouring of his Spirit, and many were brought to God,—among the rest, some French Canadians, who, in broken English, give a pleasing account of their conversion. We have now twelve classes, two local preachers, four or five exhorters, and about one hundred and eighty-seven members. This outpouring commenced in August, 1843, and the work still continues to deepen in the hearts of the people. The acquaintance of some of the young people with Scripture, and other knowledge, might shame some on older Circuits. Although many of the people are poor, we expect this Mission is on the eve of supporting itself.

## PEMBROKE.

From some cause or other there is no report from this part of the Ottawa country. But the Minutes show some improvement through the labours of the Missionary.

## BUCKINGHAM.

We have no information from this Mission. The Committee cannot but complain of the Missionaries assisted by the funds of the Society who neglect one part of their duty, in not sending annual reports of the parts in which they labour. The Committee and the subscribers expect this information, and it is hoped that the cause of complaint will no more occur.

## ST. ANDREWS.

The destitute settlers in the poor and back Townships are assisted by the Society. But as no report is sent in, the Committee can say nothing of the state of those Townships during the past year.

We have received also no reports from GLENGARRY, AMHERST ISLE, WOLF ISLAND, nor TYENDENAGA. The Society has liberally assisted those places, and it is hoped that the aid of the Society has succeeded, by the itinerant Ministers, in spreading evangelical truth, and in enlarging the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.
