

Erindale pens way to tourney

The Erindale Juveniles have earned approximately three-quarters of the \$4500 they will need to travel to British Columbia for the National Intermediate Lacrosse Tournament to be held early in August. Erindale is the only team from Ontario to earn an invitation to the prestigious tournament, which will feature sixteen teams representing most of the provinces of Canada.

The Erindale team members, who range in age from 17 to 19, have been carrying on a vigorous campaign to finance their trip and expenses. Most people who frequent the arenas and shopping centres of Mississauga have probably been confronted by a salesman specializing in pens and place mats. The pens are selling for a dollar apiece and the place mats for two dollars, a full \$1.95 below the retail price, the Times is assured.

They capture scenic sights in the provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and British Columbia.

The man instrumenting the whole excursion is Bill Shouldice, who is lavish in his praise for both the team members and CP Air.

"CP Air has been really co-operative," said Shouldice. "They are letting the boys go for the stand-by fare of \$178 and they are arranging it so that we can all be on the same flight. They may even throw in some flight bags. As for the guys on the team, they have been working really hard for this trip. I have been making them buy the pens themselves before they sell them and it is working out much better. Their girl friends are even helping them."

Erindale has been promised a Wintario grant of one thousand dollars, but it has not come through yet. This worries Shouldice somewhat because they have no money to spare.

"As it stands now," says Shouldice, "each player has to pay about a hundred dollars for his trip and there is absolutely no money to spare. It's too bad, but we can't afford to bring a manager or trainer." Shouldice, who is paying his own fare, will handle the duties of those two positions.

Erindale fared well at the Spartan tournament in St. Catharines two weeks ago, finishing second among the national field of twenty teams. They are currently 14-5 in league play and expect to win their last five games.

"Shouldice believes that Erindale was given the invitation because of their victory in the All Ontario B Championships last year. Erindale is the only local team not to have suffered a harmful transfer of players to Junior A teams and they have stayed in shape by playing competitions in areas which do not have Junior teams.

The team will leave Aug. 11 and will play their first game the following day. However, before the teams do battle on the lacrosse floor, they will parade around the arena in international Olympic fashion as a gesture of unity. Erindale will be the only team sponsoring the eight by four foot flag donated by the Chief of Protocol of Ontario.

Clarkson nets clean sweep

The Clarkson Novice team swept the Orillia Tournament last weekend, beating rival Erindale 11-6 in the last game to grab championship honors. Clarkson, from the Central Lacrosse League, had to get past Brampton in the first round to advance. Brampton had won the Orillia event against almost the same competition.

Getting some excellent goaltending from David Eckert, the Brampton scorers were continually thwarted despite the end-to-end game action. Clarkson went out in front in the second period and stayed there until the final buzzer, winning 7-4.

Clarkson swept past their second and third round opponents with relative ease, beating Rexdale 6-3 and Burlington 11-3, to qualify to meet Erindale for the championship of the 'A' division.

The championship game see-sawed until the middle of the second period when Chris Strome, Mike Lafontaine and

David Vuk scored in succession to place Clarkson out in front 7-3.

Erindale's David Buda scored his second goal of the period to slighten the lead but Clarkson exploded with four straight goals at the beginning of the third period to put the game out of reach. Erindale replied twice, making the final score 11-6.

David Vuk and Mike Lafontaine each picked up hat tricks for Clarkson. Greg Waters fired in two and Hugh Thomas, Chris Strome, and Paul How had one goal apiece. David Buda scored twice to lead Erindale, getting help from David Emberly, Serge Louise, Henry Ebron and John Brennan.

Glen Murphy was the winning pitcher, striking out eight.

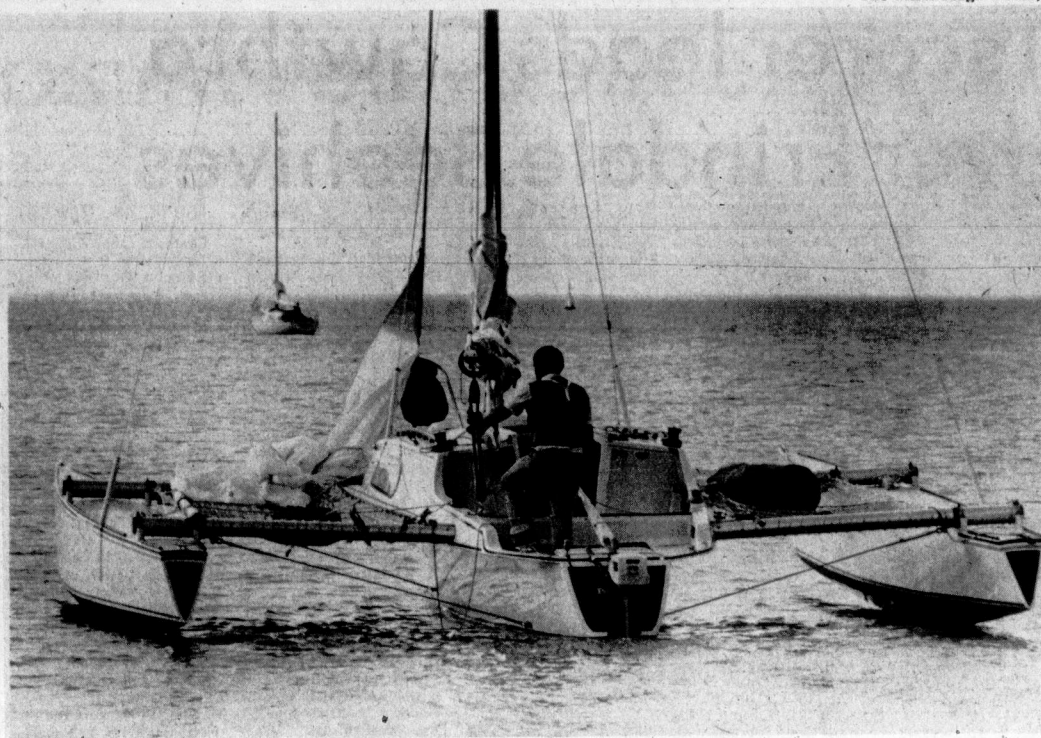
Pro Pools put the game out of reach with four runs in the first inning and had another big four run inning in the ninth.
