The figures are: Presbyterians, 11,735; Methodists, 11,642; Church of England, 10,388; Roman Catholics, 7,819; Baptists, 3,449; Christian Workers, 857; Lutheran, 681, Congregationalists, 657; Hebrews, 593, etc.

da's Graves in South Africa. List of twee Which Have Monorials—Gene-ral Monument is Toronto.

Toronto will have probably the largest and finest monument in Can-ada when the obelisk to be erected to the memory of the fallen heroes of the memory of the fallen heroes of Canada in the South African War shall have been put in place. At a recent meeting of the general committee of the South African Memorial Association the report of the Plans and Designs Committee, recommending the design of Mr. Walter S. Allward, of Toronto, was accepted. There were fourteen designs submitted.

The chosen monument will consist of a grey granite base and shaft, decorated with and surmounted by bronze figures. The figures at the base represent Canada sending her troops to the war. That which surmounts the obelisk impersonates the Glorification of Peace.

From the ground level to the top of the Peace figure the height will be 70 feet. The figure itself will be ten feet high. The shaft will be mounted on a base which at the ground level will be 32 feet square. The obelisk will weigh 120 tons.

The cost of the monument will be \$30,000. Of this sum the Ontario Government has promised \$5,000 and the City of Toronto, as soon as it can obtain the power from the Legislature, will give a like amount. It is hoped that the Dominion Government will donate a similar sum, and it is thought that the County Councils throughout Ontario will also contribute. There we's some objection taken to going to the Dominion Government for fear that other Provinces might expect a like donation, but the general feeling was that if \$5,000 were available from that source, the gift should not commit themselves to any site, as it will be

nored.

The committee did not commit themselves to any site, as it will be two years before the monument will be complete. Several sites were discussed, among them being Queen's Park and the intersection of Spadina avenue and Queen street, but no decision has been arrived at.
