Large quantities are shipped out of $L$ don every day, and the breweries cannot keep pace with the demand. The new
beer looks like the old kind, color and atl, and so resembles it in taste that the most hardened consumer can scarcely
tell the difference. That difference is merely in the after-effects. Common beers contain $3 \%$ or a trifle more of alco-
hol. The new beer contains less hol. The new beer contains less than
$2 \%$, or to be exact, $1.66 \%$ of alcohol, that
allows the beer to be sold as a temper ance drink. The act now reads that
anything under $2 \%$ anything under 2\% alcohol is a temper
ance drink, and as the local option beer is well within the mark, it must be clas
sed as sed as a temperance beverage. This is
