Johnston, that the Council leave on record, by this resolution a declaration that it was understood and decided by the Council of 1881 that a grant of 8.00 should be given to gravel the sidewalk at McMillan's grave yard—carried. W. B. Freeman moved, seconded by J. Johnston, that James Reid be appointed returning officer for Ward No. 5 in case a poll be taken for election of Reeve, Deputy Reeve and three Councillors for 1882—carried. A By law was introduced and passed appointing a place for the Nominations, and a place and returning officers for each Division for the election on; nomination to be held at Buchanan's hall, on Monday, December 26, and the election in the several Divisions as follows: Division No. 1, in a vacant house on lot 3, con. 3, at the brick yard, James Hunter, Returning officer; Division No. 2, Orange Hall, Poole, John Riley, R. O.; Division No. 3, Buchanan's hall, Newton, Alex. Munro, R. O.; Division No. 4, Orange Hall, Cartilage, John Watson, R. O.; Division No. 5, Mack's shoe shop, Bethlehem, I. Baird, R. 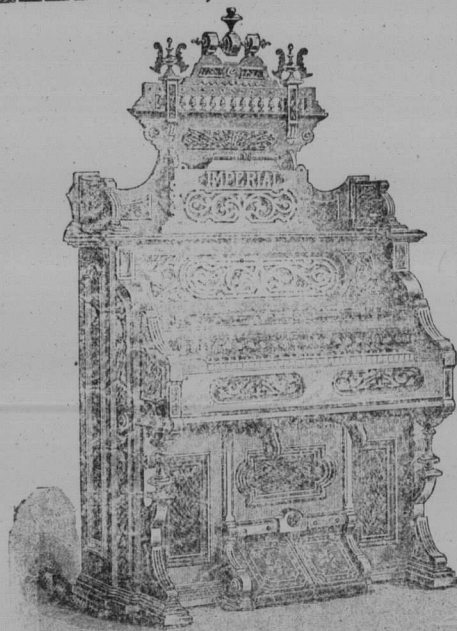
