The Temps says that when Dr. Vassel departed for Fez it had authoritative information that the principal object of his journey was to warn Mulai Hafid against El Menebhi, the former Minister of War, because the latter has visited the French and Spanish legations a: Tangier.

'Germany was discontented," says the Temps, "and for that it had despatched Dr. Vassel to enter into direct relations with Mulai Hafid. Today's rumor that Mulai Hafid intends to convoke the leading men of the country makes the situation practically identical with that of 1905. In both cases the German agent, Von Tattenbach then, and Vassel now, encouraged the Sultan who has been counting on dissensions in Europe, to resist our demands, and in both cases, an assembly of notables served as a pretext for resistance.
