The whole of the cahnet ministers were invited to the ceremony, and began to assemble at the palace at six o'clock, being conducted on their arrival to the library. In the garden of the palace a guard of horor, composed of Foot Guards, was on duty, and, on the arrival of their Royal Highnesses the Butchess of Kent, the Dutchess of Cambridge, received them with the usual military honors, the band playing "God save the Queen." The royal family were conducted to one of the lower drawing-rooms. The diplomatic representatives of Prussia, Portugal, and Beigium were honored with invitations to the ceremony, and were conducted to the same apartments is the ashinet ministers, all the approaches to which were guarded by the Yeoman of the Guard while the entrance of the private chapel was lined by the Queen's honorable corps of Gentlamen-at-Arms.
