

AUSTRIANS STILL RETREATING.

Enormous Quantity of Munitions and War supplies Captured.

Petrograd, June 13—The war office announcement of today says that the retreat of the Austrian and German troops along the Galician and Volhynian fronts is proceeding so rapidly that only a small number of prisoners has been captured, in addition to those previously reported. The total is given at about 115,700, as compared with approximately 114,700 announced

yesterday. The statement says:

"On account of the fact that in many places the Austro-Hungarian and Austro-German troops withdrew rapidly before the blows of our southern army, the number of prisoners increased only very little. The total now amounts to about 1,700 officers and 114,000 men."

 And so we captured Cameroon, and then there were two.

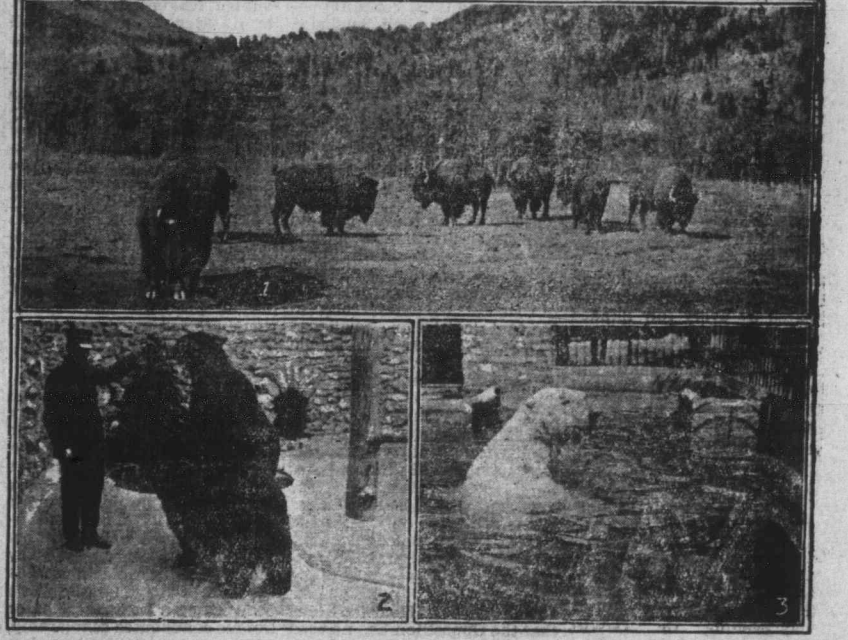
Two little colonies from Botha tried to run;

CANADIAN ZOO

In the Canadian Zoo at Banff, Alberta, within the Rocky Mountains Park and along the C.P.R., both at the zoo adjoining the museum and out at the animal paddock about two miles east of the town, there are fine specimens of buffalo, moose, elk, deer, Persian sheep, Angora goats, bears, wolves, coyotes, lynx, badgers, martens, and a number of the smaller animals.

One yak, originally presented to the Dominion Government by the Duke of Bedford, were tendered by the former to the Rocky Mountains Park. They were brought to Banff from the experimental farm at Brandon, and are now in a healthy and flourishing condition. Their quaint appearance, causing them to be objects of much interest. The park commissioner suggests that it would be an interesting experiment to attempt to cross one of the buffalo bulls with one of the yak cows.

In the Zoo, adjacent to the museum, may be seen the following animals of the Rocky Mountains:
 Black bears, Chinaman bears, grizzly bears, red foxes, kit foxes, timber wolves, coyotes, lynx, American panther (or mountain lion), badgers, pine martens, porcupines, mountain gopher, albino gophers, marmots, fox squirrels, black squirrels, Canada geese, hawks, golden eagles, black-headed eagles, owls, pelican.

The following animals, from distant parts of the world, may be seen in the Zoo:
 Kingtail monkey, rhesus monkey, polar bear, raccoons, orange squirrel, silver pheasants, golden pheasants, Amherst pheasants, Reeves pheasants, common pheasants, pea fowls.
