The organization may or may not affiliate with the Ontario Beckepeers Association.

It will also be the object of the association to discuss the best means of increasing the consumption of honey and consequently obtain more remunerative prices. The past experience of the beckepeers in detail will be called out on that occasion. A copy of the report of that meeting and its discussions will be sent to the beckepeers of Leeds and Grenville who send a card with their address to M. B. Holmes, Athens.

In the meantime invitations will be sent to all the beckepeers whose addresses we now have. Ultimately the date of the meeting will be published in the local papers.
