TARTE ADMITS DEFEAT

He Says the Government is Gone--Has Given up Hope.

Montreal, Nov. 5.—"I consider that my election is in great danger, and I believe that we will be defeated throughout the country."

This startling statement was made this morning to an intimate friend by no other than Hon. J. I. Tarte, Minister of Public Works. The fact of the matter is, there is a strong current running against the government in the province of Quebec and anything may be expected from there on Wednesday night.

The Hon. Horace Archambault, Attorney-General, returned from the east to-day, and he reports to the Liberal party here that unless they have a good majority in Ontario the Liberal government is doomed.

THEIR WILL BE LEFT SO.

QUERECQ ALL RIGHT.

Mr. McMaster Declares It Will Go Back on Sir Wilfrid.

Toronto, Nov. 6.—The special train, carrying the Conservative leaders, who were speaking at various points, arrived here at ten o'clock. Hon. Louis Beaubien, Donald McMaster, Hon. George E. Foster and the other speakers who came up were received by the leading Conservatives of the city, and an impromptu meeting was held in the waiting room. Hon. Louis Beaubien was called upon and paid a tribute to the wonderful energy of Sir Charles Tupper. He then closed with a prophecy of victory on Wednesday. Mr. McMaster said the day's progress had been a triumphal march and ventured to add that Quebec would go back on Laurier when the ballots were counted.

GOING BACK ON STEPHENS.

Mr. Pardo Admits the Lake Shore Will Not do as Well as Usual For Him.

T. L. Pardo, M. P. P., passed through the city last evening. In a short chat with The Planet Mr. Pardo expressed his expectations of the election of Ald. Stephens, the Liberal candidate in this riding, although he did not look for as strong a Liberal vote as in the last election. The Liberals would hardly do as well there as usual. Speaking of the governmental prospects Mr. Pardo hopes to see the Laurier party sustained after the election. He anticipates that their majority will be reduced, but looks to Ontario to assist in sustaining them. If there is any slump towards Conservatism Mr. Pardo looks for it in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

AT STEEN'S SCHOOLHOUSE

Out in Dover There Was Another Boring Smith Meeting Last Night.

A very largely attended meeting gathered at Steen's school house last evening to hear about the coal oil, binder twine, sugar and fence wire extortions. C. R. Atkinson and Geo. G. Martin spoke for the Liberal Conservatives, and although opposition was cordially invited no one dared champion a lost cause. Jos. Lewis took the chair at 8 p.m. Mr. Atkinson was first called upon when that gentleman in a masterly, eloquent speech of over one hour fully exposed the wrongdoings of the farmers in the increased prices of almost everything they consume. Mr. Atkinson was loudly cheered. Immediately after speaking Mr. Atkinson at once proceeded to Pail Court where another large meeting was held, and left Mr. Martin to discuss the several other important questions before the country. Mr. Martin is well known in that section and was received with tremendous cheers. Mr. Martin showed up the seventeen broken pledges of the Government and dealt with the hypocrisy of the Government as to all their promises. He explained to the good

farmers how the Hardy Government passed an act that would land every one of them in the county gaol if they owed a company one dollar's arrears of interest on a mortgage, and how an indignant public opinion compelled him to repeal that act the very next session. Mr. Martin sat down with deafening cheers. Roaring cheers were given for T. A. Smith, the chairman and the Queen.

QUIT THEIR PARTY.

Three Well-Known New Brunswick Liberals Have Thrown Over the Government.

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 6.—Reports of accessions to the Conservative ranks come from all quarters. At Mr. Powell's meeting at Cape Sable, a French district, a few nights ago, the chairman was Antoine Groulx, an ex-member of Parliament, and for many years sheriff of Kent county. He is a life-long Liberal, who announced that while he had not left his party, he was supporting the Conservatives in this contest with all his might.

At a Conservative meeting in Goudville, another French district in Westmorland, the chairman was Olmstead Belliveau, who explained his presence in that capacity by saying that though for 18 years a Liberal he had come to the conclusion that no honest man could stay with that party and he had decided to vote for Mr. Powell. Maxime D. Cormier, who had been almost continually a member of the Kent Municipal Council, and who was a former supporter of Mr. Leblanc, the Liberal candidate, is now supporting Mr. McIsaac, Conservative.

LIS BALS DISCUS BO.

Will Vote Conservative in P.E.I. Elections in Large Numbers.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Nov. 6.—A commercial traveller who has just returned from Prince Edward Island reports that nothing but a miracle could save the Liberals from defeat in the whole five seats. At a meeting of the Tupper Club, which was attended by between five and six hundred people, a prominent man, who had been a Liberal all his life, in the course of his speech declared that he could pick out at least one hundred and seventy-five hundred and seventy-five men, he said, who were disgusted with the broken pledges, incompetence, and corruption of which Sir Louis Davies was the Laurier-Tarte representative.

TRIED TO POISON HIM.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—In Montmagny, which the Liberals are certain to lose, a jug of water handed up to Mr. Laurier at a Conservative meeting was "doctored." He drank some of the water and the poison acted so quickly he was laid out before he could take enough to kill him. A doctor brought him around.
