THE WORLD OF VANITY.

Trimming Are Now Horizontal. Hood Effects Very Smart.

There seems to be a complete revolution in trimming. It is placed horizontally instead of vertically. This is especially true of the full gathered skirts, which are decorated with bands of velvet silk and lace in some instances four or five inches wide. Kilt

ed skirts are similarly decorated with these bands, usually three or five in number.

Tiny velvet balls are among the latest dress trimmings, and these are outlined on both sides of a straight lace band.

The hood effect, drooping off the shoulders, has come to be considered more smart than the bertha. It is faced with lace or velvet.

Little stoles of ermine and lace will be worn far into the spring with street costumes and gowns.

Velling will continue to be one of the favorite spring materials, particularly in gray and black.

Separate white skirts of novelty velling are very smart to wear with lace waists of the same color.

The number of blouses that are requisite to complete the wardrobe of the fashionable woman makes a very serious hole in her dress allowance.

At the best of times there is very little wear in mouseline de sole of chiffon, and when it means, in addition, the constant drawing off and on of a fur coat or mantle the problem becomes quite a grave and important one. It is good hearing that some of the newest shantings, both natural and dyed, are being fashioned in a chiffon weight, which offers a way out of the difficulty for reasons of economy as well as expediency. There is a certain suggestion of plainness about a shanting, but it can be trimmed and decorated to the pink of modiste perfection. It is a point in its favor, too, that the natural silks of this description have the added advantage of being none the worse for immersion in the wash tub, which saves those alarming cleaner's bills which represent the heavy toll levied on extravagance.

DRESS NOVELTIES.

Some New Dress Skirts—Black and White Effects.

Much black and white are seen in the new spring millinery, and this was exemplified in a three cornered hat seen recently. It was of fine straw in a dead white shade, the upturned brim being of heavier black satin straw. The

sole trimming was on the left side—two tips, one black, the other white passed through a small Louis XV wreath of tiny white roses and held down by a knot of gold galleon.

The triple skirt is one of the novelties in fashion. It is eased in slightly at the waist, so that it falls in graceful fullness.

Another up to date skirt is gathered at the waist and trimmed with five wide folds to simulate tucks.

A skirt not quite so new, but popular, is made with two clusters of bias folds high in the back and coming down into a point in the front. The lowest of these clusters heads a gathered flounce which is similarly graduated. The back is finished with a double box plait.

The cut shows a hat of black tulle having a band of black velvet and a steel buckle. It is trimmed on each side with a black ostrich tip.

THE WORLD'S GREAT PORTS

London Heads the List and New York Is in Second Place.

The recent report by the Antwerp bureau of statistics on foreign tonnage entered at the principal ports of the world having proved to be incomplete, and for the United States misleading, the Washington department of commerce and labor has issued a corrected statement on the same subject. It may be accepted as showing the tonnage (consistently trade not included) entered at the largest ports of the world—ports having a tonnage of over 1,000,000 tons—during the year 1902, with the exception of the United States ports, the figures of which are for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903.

The figures for the United States and Great Britain are taken from the official publications of both countries, while the greater number of the remainder are taken from the annual reports of the United States consuls for 1903, but covering tonnage figures for 1902:

Cancer Discoveries.

Important discoveries in connection with cancer were announced at the recent annual meeting in London of the general committee of the cancer research fund. Distinguished experts briefly summed up their year's work as follows:

Civilization is not the cause of cancer, which pervades animal as well as human life and attacks all its subjects at relatively the same age and periods.

It is not an infectious disease and is not transmissible from one species to another. A cancer cell can reacquire powers of self propagation.

Cancer is not caused by a parasite. The malarial is not on the increase. Radium has been found to exercise no curative effect.

Severe cases have been discovered from which good results are hoped.

The first authentic cases of cancer in animals were minutely described by experiments which had been made on fish and wild mice.

The Hairy Man of Archangel.

From all parts of north Russia peasants are traveling on a pilgrimage to an extraordinary hermit, Prokop Selevisch, who is known as "the hairy man of Archangel." Five years ago, in an excess of religious mania, he cut off all his hair on his left hand. When he heard that the Russians had suffered misfortune in the far east he declared it was the result of their sins, which could be atoned only by a sacrifice offered to Mother Earth. At first he said he did not know the significance of this declaration. But on John the Baptist's day he represented that he had been commanded to plant himself in the earth and there remain until the unbelievers, meaning the Japanese, were beaten or until black leaves sprouted from his fingerless hand. He has accordingly planted himself up to his knees in earth in his hut. There he now remains, with a granddaughter to look after him.

Oklahoma's Marksmen Best.

Three of the best marksmen in the United States navy, curiously enough, hail from far inland Oklahoma. One is C. W. Johnson, who made the high gun record with the huge sixteen inch gun recently installed at Fort Wright, on Fisher's Island, Long Island sound. J. W. Creitz of the new battleship Maine made eight shots in a minute with a six inch gun and hit the target eight times at 1,600 yards, the ship meantime going twelve knots an hour. Bart Barnes, a son of ex-Governor Barnes of Oklahoma, is now a first lieutenant in the navy, but previous to his promotion he made an excellent record at the target. He is now on duty at Panama—Boston Transcript.

Tobacco Hearts at Annapolis.

It is estimated that about 20 per cent of the young men who recently applied to enter the Naval academy have failed in the physical test, and the failure was largely due to the use of tobacco, resulting in the irregular beating of the heart. Nowadays physicians speak of "the tobacco heart," a trouble caused by the excessive use of the weed.

When a smoker develops into a "cigarette fiend," the services of a physician are necessary, but before this point is reached the heart may be permanently injured.—Baltimore Herald.

ONTARIO RIFLE MATCHES.

Three Complete Events on Wednesday—Shooting Above the Average.

Toronto, Aug. 25.—Yesterday at the Ontario Rifle Association matches the program was more of a social one than on the opening day. After the Osler Cup match, E. B. Osler, M.P., president of the Association, gave a luncheon, and speeches urging the importance of rifle shooting were made by the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. J. M. Gibson and Mr. Osler.

There were three complete events on the card yesterday, the Macdonald, Osler and Duke of Cornwall and York matches, while the City of Toronto contest, begun on Tuesday, was completed. Pte. J. Stratton of the 37th, carried off the honors in the first named and Pte. G. Scheurer of the Q.O.R. in the second. In the City of Toronto finals, Corp. R. McGregor of the G.G.F.G., Ottawa, who led in the primary stage, maintained his position, and with a total of 116 points secured the gold medal and \$25 cash awarded the winner. McGregor is one of the most consistent shots in Canada. He has been a competitor in association matches for years and has earned a splendid reputation.

Shooting Above Average.

There were about 320 entries in each of the four events decided yesterday, the list of entries being practically the same for each contest. The average of marksmanship in all four was above last year's.

To-day's great attraction will be the Tait-Brasserie match, which is known as the militiaman's contest.
