**Editorial Brevities.**

There will be no civic contest again this year in Wolfville. Councilors Harvey and DeWitt retired at the end of their term and their places in the new Council will be filled by Mr. Edson Graham and Prof. Alex Sutherland. Mayor Hales was re-elected without opposition for another term.

Every man engaged in business or in any way interested in the material prosperity of his town and vicinity, or in the educational affairs of his community, or in the moral purity of society in his neighborhood, is under great obligations to his local paper, and should give it a liberal support, not as charity, but as a duty to himself, to his family, and to his neighbors, and as a wise investment of his money.

Collectors are around this week taking contributions for the Salvation Army. For the first time since the war started it looks as though Wolfville was going to fall down in its objectives. This is a worthy and noble as any other to which we have been asked to give. The business section of the town is where the bulk of the contribution is expected, but so far the amount collected in this section is only half of what was collected for the Navy League, and in this campaign we are asked for more than we were for the Navy League. Unless most of the people double up their contributions, the Salvation Army Drive in Wolfville is going to be a miserable failure. Surely we have more pride in our town than to let anything like that happen. Any one wishing to give further to this most worthy object will please hand their contributions to the treasurer, H. P. Davidson.

**The Municipal Council.**

The Municipal Council of Kings County met at Kentville on Tuesday, Jan. 14th, at 7 o'clock, a. m. The morning session was mostly taken up with the reports of committees. Mr. J. L. Hisey was appointed Solicitor for the Municipality. After hearing the report of the committee appointed to ascertain the value of sheep killed or injured by dogs in the vicinity of North Kington it was ordered that two-thirds the amount of loss to the respective owners of such sheep be paid from the Municipal Treasury.

The Council reassembled at 2 p. m. The reports of the Overseers of Poor were read. Aylesford asked for Assessment of \$1400; Horton of \$2500, and Cornwallis of \$3000. The reports were adopted. The Clerk spoke in reference to persons who, in the past, have been exempted from the performance of statute labor on the highways on account of the fact that they resided at a distance from the highway and were under the necessity of maintaining private roads to their residences. As there was no opportunity for such exemption under the present law he suggested that the matter be brought to the attention of the Legislature. Council adjourned.

The Council again met on Wednesday morning. The clerk introduced the presentment explaining that the necessity of making an appropriation for school equal to fifty cents per head of population instead of thirty-five cents as before, and the increased cost of care of the insane would necessitate an increase of revenue. After discussion the rate of assessment was fixed at seventy cents on the hundred dollars. The tax on dogs was fixed at the lowest rate allowed by law, one dollar on males and five dollars on females. Mr. Ephraim Haverstock was re-appointed Inspector under the Nova Scotia Temperance Act at salary of \$150.

After recess the Council was resumed at 2 p. m. The Warden and Clerk were appointed delegates to the Convention of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities to be held in Yarmouth. An appropriation of \$200 to the Children's Aid Society for the coming year was ordered. Council adjourned.

**The Boy Scouts.**

This evening the Scout Hockey Team will entertain the Cranning Boys at supper in the Club Room at 7:30.

The Juniors will have games as usual in the gymnasium and tests in the upper reading room.

At 9 o'clock the first hockey game of the season will be played at the rink. An admission fee of 10c will be charged and it is hoped that as many as possible will attend to help out expenses.
