

Primitive Baptists Founded by Rev.
George W. Orser—Paper on This
Denomination Read at
Meeting of New Brunswick Historical Society

(St. John Telegraph)
A very interesting paper on the life of Rev. George W. Orser, founder of the Primitive Baptists, a denomination which orginated in 1874 in New Brunswick and which now has a membership of 2,500, has thirty-seven church buildings, ten ordained ministers and five licentiates, was read last evening at the meeting of the New Brunswick Historical Society held in the society's rooms, in the Market Building with Rev. William Armstrong, the president, in the chair. The paper was prepared by M. L. Hayward of Hartland, and in his absence was read by George Henderson. (St. John Telegraph)

Mr. Hayward's paper referred to the fact that New Brunswick has no dearth of creeds and sects, but only one church was native to the soil. Rev. G. W. Orser, the founder of the native denomination had been the son of William Orser, of New York, a Loyalist of Dutch extraction and his wife Mary Blake, the first white fe-Loyalist of Dutch extraction and his wife Mary Blake, the first white female born in New Brunswick. William Orser was the first settler on the ste which is now Hartland. George Orser was born on June 27, 1813. At he age of fifteen he was converted and did some preaching about that time. He married Miss Abigail Shaw when he was twenty. His wife was
