## Canadian Failures.

Canadian Failures. Insolvencies in the Dominion of Canada during the monta of Oxober were 128 in num-ber and \$1,422,857 in annount of liabilities, which compares with 29 defaults in the same month last year, when insolities were only \$860,187. The increase is muon emailer when comparison is made with the same month in earlier years, as the Canadian report for Oc-tober, 1966, was unusually favorable. Manu-facturing indexes this year numbered 88 with inabilities of \$756,582, against only 17 similar defaults inst year when the amount involved was \$132,770. Much of this increase occurred in two large suspensions in pulp manufac-turing and contracting. Trading failures numbered 07 for \$404,00, against 73 has year, when the amount was \$01,357. Six other commercial failures supplied liabilities of \$11, \$66 against only two last year for \$8,000. Copper Pool.


## **COBALT NOTES**
