Unfortunately; this privilege has wittingly; sometimes deliberatelyby a large number of persons in that they agreed to retun to Canada within six mouths but did not do so.

It is apparent that such persons do not realize the penalties they must inevitably incur for violating this temporary stay privilege. Under the the United States under -this six months temporary stay privilege. and who do not return to Canada within six months as they agreed; are liable to severe penalties. They are as follows:

(1) After the expiration of their six months' stay they are Nable to arrest and deportation to Canada and persons so coported are prohibited from re-entering the Uhited States

(2) The head tax of \$8 and visa of \$10 cannot be paid in the United States; but such persons must return to Canada and appear before the United States Consul of the district in which they reside and obtain a visa. They must also pay a head tax at the recognized point of exit in Canada. In the Maritime Province there are three Yarmouth; Nova Scotia; Halifax; Nova Scotia and St. John: New Brunswick.

(3) No person may become a citizen of the United States or take out first papers who in entering the United States has not complied with

Utilities Board Notifies New castle Police Chief to Step Vendor

A telephone message from the Newcastle chief of police was received last Friday by the Board of Utilities, stating that Nova Scotian, J. R. Beck, was selling German bonds in that town and asking for instructions as to what steps to take.

E. S.
