## CHRISTIAN ZIEHR'S CREDITORS.

The German who peccadilloes were de-  
scribed in part last week's SIGNAL did not  
get out of his difficulties when he settled  
with his creditors, Wm. W. McLean,  
The Hamburg Independent says:—No  
small excitement existed in Stratford on  
Tuesday last, when Detective Bluet and  
Mr. McLean arrived with C. Ziehr, who  
had absconded. Unfortunately for  
Christian he was seen, or he might  
have escaped. He had been seen at the  
reach of Canadian authorities again,  
but such was his luck. Some rather sour  
faces became visible on Wednesday in  
this place, when it was found out that  
he had been seen in Stratford the pre-  
vious evening, and that he was again mis-  
sionary to the town. Mr. McLean and  
others were sent out in all directions, de-  
tectives and constables, with fury depicted  
on their countenances, were seen with  
their ear bent to the fugitive's trail, and  
while some of our citizens were benomi-  
ng his escape again, his chances certain-  
ly are not good. After numerous vigor-  
ous and circuitous chases the guilty one  
was captured by constable Wilson, of  
Stratford, in Wellesley. From there he  
was taken to jail, where he will probably  
have ample time to rue his thoughtless  
yet none the less sinful actions. Chris-

## THE TRUE STORY.

Upon Which Londoners Built  
the Pestilence Sensation.

Now an English Emigrant Afflicted with  
a Contagious Disease Travelled From  
Place to Place—Where the Blame  
Should be Laid.

On Monday last upon the arrival of  
the London papers, considerable atten-  
tion was caused by the fact that an arti-  
cle of a highly sensational character was  
found to be contained in both the *Advertiser*  
and *Free Press*, in which the con-  
duct of certain medical men of Goderich,  
as well as that of the town authorities  
was held up to severe censure. The  
territory to be represented will embrace  
a very large area. Say from Georgetown  
on the G. T. R. nearly due north to  
Meaford and Owen Sound taking in the  
peninsula between Georgian Bay and  
Lake Huron; and from Georgetown  
westerly to Fort Snodgrass on the lake.

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It is stated that the patient had been a  
resident of Goderich for some three  
months, and, having contracted the dis-  
ease, was cast adrift to make shift for  
himself as best he could; that he had  
been sent out of town by the corporation  
authorities; and that a number of the  
medical men of Goderich had conspired  
to send him out of the town, and to that end  
had furnished him with a ticket for Lon-  
don and money to defray necessary ex-  
penses. Talk was indulged in as to the  
propriety of sending the unfortunate man  
back to Goderich, and thereby teaching  
the outside points that London should not,  
henceforth be looked upon as a place of  
refuge for those in affliction. The above  
and a lot of other matter of a similar na-  
ture, were contained in the frantic arti-  
cles of the London papers, which, if they  
had their own way, would have written  
*anathema maranatha* upon the name of  
Goderich.

With the object of finding out the  
state affairs, a reporter of THE  
SIGNAL undertook to enquire into the  
antecedents of the emigrant—whose  
name is John Little; whether he was a  
resident of Goderich or not; the length  
of time which he had resided in the  
town; if the local authorities had any  
business with Goderich, and if so, what  
it was; and what was the conduct of our  
medical men in the premises. Upon  
careful enquiry we found the following  
to be

THE TRUE FACTS OF THE CASE.

Something over a month ago Little,  
accompanied by his wife, arrived in Can-  
ada with a lot of other emigrants, and  
travelled to East Zorra township, near  
Woodstock, where they obtained an  
employment in the household of a well-to-  
do farmer. Shortly after their arrival  
Mrs. Little was stricken down with  
small-pox, and after a brief illness died.  
The husband also contracted the disease,  
and became very low in spirits. This  
in this state he was bathed in an antiseptic  
solution of carbolic acid and water, a  
new suit of clothes was given him, and  
some money with which to pay his fare  
to relatives who reside in Huron county.

On Wednesday, the 9th inst., he arrived  
at Seaford, and from thence proceeded  
to Woodstock, where they obtained em-  
ployment. He was there but a short time  
when the nature of the disease was discovered,  
and, as happens usually in outside munici-  
palities, it was determined to send him  
to the county town, the impression being  
that in Goderich he could get better  
treatment than here in the country. As
