The Hague Award.

The findings of the Arbitrators at the Hague on the questions submitted to them under the powers conferred on them by the several Articles of the Special Agreement of February, 1909, seem to us satisfactory. The great fight put up by America was on the question of the sovereign power of legislation. On this issue the British contention was wholly sustained.

The British contention was that Great Britain, Canada or Newfoundland could make regulations which were consistent with a bona fide carrying out of the Convention. America claimed a share in the making of this legislation. The American claim was not allowed by the Arbitrators.

The question of conflict between such regulations and the liberties conferred on Americans is a question apart. As no provision appears in the Convention of 1818 for settling such a conflict, either in regard to present or future regulations, it was agreed by the parties under Articles II, III, and IV, of the Submission signed in February of last year that tribunals, rules, etc., should be devised by the Arbitrators. This was done.

The decision on Question II, is interesting. The Tribunal practically decides that Americans are immune from penalties for employing as members of their crews fishing in treaty waters persons who are not inhabitants of the United States. But that the latter, whether British or alien, are subject to penalties imposed by British laws. In other words, such penalties do not conflict with the Convention when imposed on British people, or other non-inhabitants of the United States, but they do conflict with the Convention when imposed on inhabitants of the United States.

These findings on Questions I. and II. will hit Gloucester hard.

On Question III. America gains somewhat. American fishermen are not to be subjected to the commercial formalities of report, entry and clearance at a Custom House, nor to light dues, etc., not imposed on Newfoundland fishermen. They are, however, to report their presence when reasonable facilities are afforded them to do so. In other words, there is to be no discrimination against Americans.

We shall have more to say on these and the remainder of the findings tomorrow.

Worst Fishery Ever.

Mr. W. Sclater, merchant, Water Street, received a letter from Flat Islands, B.B., last mail saying that out of 36 schooners at the Labrador fishery there only four have even a half load of fish. The others have from 10 to 30 barrels. It is the very worst fishery on record. The people don't know what they are going to do to get food for the coming winter.

POLICE COURT NEWS.

There was a clean docket before Judge Conroy to-day. Some 15 civil cases were adjudicated upon in the Central District Court and one between a doctor and a mechanic for the recovery of \$32.50, was postponed for a week.

Manuel Creates Peers.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LISBON, Sept. 19.

It is believed that King Manuel's appointment of 16 Peers, all supporters of the present Liberal Court, will afford sufficient strength to the Government to avoid the necessity of a dissolution of parliament and new elections which the Republicans declare would mean revolution. Dr. Alpoim, Chief of the Progressive Democrats recently told His Majesty that unless he insisted upon the Liberal Government in enforcing political reforms, the monarchy would be doomed and a republic inevitable. The Government continues its campaign against the Jesuits and is proceeding with the expulsion of other religious orders which re-entered Portugal after the issuance of the Decree of 1901, but which are not devoted to the work of charity or teaching as provided in the decree. The newspapers state that the Monks are fleeing to the mountains for refuge.

Failed to Fly Over the Alps.

Bulgarian Crisis.

A cabinet crisis arising partly through the failure of the Government's Macedonian policy and partly because of corruption in the ministry of the interior has been solved by the resignation of the Cabinet. Malinoff retains the Portfolio of Premier but he exchanged the Portfolio of Minister of Public Works for that of Foreign Affairs.

Botha Retains the Premiership

It was officially announced to-day that General Louis Botha will retain the Premiership despite the losses sustained by the Nationalists in the recent elections at the new federal assembly and his own defeat at the hands of the Unionist Candidate, Sir Percy Fitzpatrick.

Sugar Refiner Imprisoned.

Charles R. Helke, former Secretary and Treasurer of the American Sugar Refining Company who has been called the man higher up in the Sugar Trust was sentenced to-day by Judge Minton in the United States Circuit Court to serve 8 months in the New York Prison on Blackwell's island and a fine of \$5,000 on conviction of conspiring to defraud the United States Government by the under weighing of sugar.

The One Hundred Years' Peace.

Special to Evening Telegram. BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 19.

An unlimited treaty of obligatory arbitration between the United States and Great Britain is the hope of the American Peace Society, as a result of the proposition that the two countries join in 1914 in a celebration to observe the completion of 100 years of peace between them. The plan for a celebration in keeping with the position among nations of the countries discussed interested and the occasion has not yet approached the point.

Typhoid Spreading.

Typhoid fever is still very prevalent both at Millertown and Grand Falls, and two deaths have occurred at the former place, where a temporary hospital has been erected. There are fifty cases at Grand Falls, and it is thought that bad drainage has polluted the water and caused the disease to spread. In the city yesterday a case of the disease developed at a residence on Pleasant Street, a woman being stricken. There are now three cases being nursed at the hospital here, and three others at their homes.


