New Disclosures In Dynamite Conspiracy Through

40,000 Letters.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 16. - New lisclosures made in the dynamite conspiracy cases through 40,000 letters and telegrams quoted in the indictments as implicating practically all the officials of the International at a previous conference. The correspondence contained in one of thirty-two indictments and embracing what are termed "unconsummated acts of conspiracy" is held as showing that a vast plot, known to Frank R. Ryan, President of the Iron workers, and to members of his executive and many business agents was carried on for six years to destroy the property of steel contractors who employed non-union labor. It charges all the defendants with being equally guilty as abettors. It also purports to reveal evidence that jobs became the accepted term and that gradually the officials of local unions began to call on the interna national headquarters in Indianapolis to assist by dynamite and nitroglycer ine in increasing the expenses of the open shop" contractors.
