WASHINGTON, To-day. The charge that members of the House were guilty of petty grafting, was made by representative Fitzgerald, chairman of the Appropriations Committee. The allegation precipitated a wordy war, in the course of which Fitzgerald himself was accused of having submitted for payment bills for material, for which there was no provision by law.



The Jewer Murder.

Boston, May 21 .- Mrs. Lilian Jewr, a widow, 30 years old, who is said to have come here recently from Mon-treal, was found murdered in her apartments in the South End yesterday. Her nostrils were stuffed with string, her mouth choked with a kim-

ono, a towel was tightly tied about her neck and there were bruises on her head. According to Medical Examiner Leary the woman had be dead since Friday.

A suspect was held by the police to-day in connection with the murder of Mrs. Jewer. The police withheld the man's name, but say that he was employed as a waiter. It was alleged that the man being detained caused the woman some trouble a few weeks ago and that she changed her place of residence.

The body of the woman was found by R. A. Basset, a milk man. The police were notified, and the Medical Examiner after a hasty examination stated that death was due to strangulation from a towel knotted about th neck. In their investigations, the police discovered that Miss Pearl Char otte, also formerly of Montreal, knew he woman, and from her it was learned that Mrs. Jewer came here from the Canadian metropolis. Miss Char-lotte also stated that the dead woman had an eight-year-old daughter i Connecticut. The trail soon led to small eating saloon on Broomfield Strand there Hopping was taken into custody.
