## At the City Hall. No Freight Offering at Montreal.

The weekly session of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon.

A claim for damages caused by the overflowing of a gully was made by Solicitors Morris and Dunfield.

Mr. F. Collier asked permission to build annex to house on Forest Road. He also complained of the unsanitary drain on Cabot Street, and asked for sewerage connection on Braumont St. The Road Inspector will look to Cabot Street and the sewerage matter was deferred.

Permission was given M. Fitzhenry, Dillie Street, to repair house.

Permission was granted to F. Rowe to make repairs to house on Barter's Hill; and to Capt. Couch to repair house on Springdale Street.

Plans of proposed alterations to Mr. K. Noah's building must be sent to Council.

The Engineer's report was read. It stated that the Mayor and East End Road Committee had visited Plymouth Road, Walsh's Square, Battery Road, Rennie's Mill Road, and other streets with a view to making improvements. Mayor Ellis offered some recommendations and the Engineer was notified to prepare plans.

Plans were submitted and approved from J. Warfield, Monroe & Co. and Lee Murphy.

Mrs. Baidge, Gower Street, was given permission to repair house.

Mr. Spurrell and Mrs. Hudson were granted leave to avail of the small house sewer system.

It was decided to paint the fences at King's Bridge and Rennie's Hill and lay pipes in Factory Lane.

The Engineer will report on the retaining wall on Harvey Road.

Water pipes will be extended on Pennywell Road. Engineer will also report on gully near Signal Hill.

Mayor Ellis moved that the Park at the foot of Garrison Hill be called "Garrison Square." The motion was seconded by Councillor Mullaly and adopted.

The meeting closed at 6 p.m.

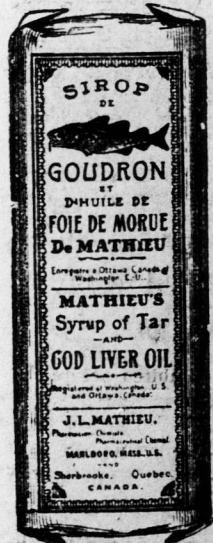

## Cable News.

KIEL, July 19.  
A German battleship rammed a torpedo boat, while the smaller craft was crossing the bows of a big war ship during a night attack on this port. Three of the crew were killed, the damaged vessel being towed to Kiel harbour.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19.  
Eight Italian torpedo boats attacked the entrance to the Dardanelles this morning. The Turkish fort replied vigorously, sinking two and damaging the other six. The Cabinet ministers were hurriedly called to the Palace, and, at a council of War, it was decided to close the Dardanelles.

DUBLIN, July 19.  
Mary Leigh, Gladys Evers, Lizzie Baller and Mary Goffe appeared in the police court to-day, charged with throwing a hatchet at Premier Asquith, attending to set fire to the theatre, and having in their possession inflammable materials for the purpose. The accused were all committed for trial. The Leigh woman admitted hurling the hatchet.

LONDON, July 19.  
The leaders of the London Dock strike to-day sent a cablegram to Gompers, President of the American Federation of labour, asking for immediate financial assistance, local finances being exhausted. The leaders fear that the strikers will be starved into unconditional surrender.

## Smallpox Again.

Dr. Campbell yesterday afternoon visited a house, in Walsh's Square, where Mrs. Bennett and family reside, found the mother and 4 children ill, and that they had been so for a few days. The woman's mother also suffered and the doctor made the discovery that all were suffering from smallpox. It is of the usual mild type and the house was quickly quarantined. Those not ill in the house were held for observation. It is not known how the family contracted the disease.
