

Days Past-174 To Come-190 St. John Baptist-Midsummer Day. BATTLE OF BANNOCKBURN 1314. When Edward II. in attempting to carry out the subjugation of Scotland. and on his way to relieve Stirling, which was being besieged by the Scots, he was met at Bannockburn by Bruce and a small Scottish Army. The English were totally defeated. Edward only saving himself by flight.

LORD KITCHENER born 1850. He entered the Army in 1871 and has since had a brilliant and successful career in nearly all parts of the world where British soldiers have signalized themselves in recent years.
