It was learned today. The pouch was believed to have contained no diplomatic correspondence.**WILSON'S ANNUAL MESSAGE.**
WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.
Both Houses of Congress were in brief session today to hear President Wilson's annual message. It was read by the clerk. Wilson confined himself almost wholly to domestic questions. Only by inference did his message refer to the nearing close of his administration, and that was in the concluding paragraph. The proposals he presented, the President wrote, were not so much a series of recommendations as a confession "of the faith in which I was bred, and which it is my solemn purpose to stand by until my last fighting day."**ESTIMATES TO BE CUT.**
LONDON, Dec. 7.
Government supporters in the House of Commons today were brought into line for a second reading of the Dyeing Bill, against which irreconcilable free traders are making a dead set. Thursday will witness the debate on national expenditure, which, in view of the outcry for economy, must be important. It is expected that the estimates will have to be cut all around, and the Government is being pressed to prevent any fresh schemes involving further expenditure.**COMMONS MAY SHOW HOSTILITY.**
LONDON, Dec. 8.
The House of Lords today resumed the second reading of the Agricultural Bill, which is arousing much hostility. It is certain to be materially amended, though it is unlikely it will be thrown out. House of Lords yesterday concluded the committee stage of Home Rule Bill. It is not thought that their drastic amendments will smooth the way to further progress and alterations made in the constitution of Senate and taxation proposals, are sure to arouse disagreement in the Commons.**GREECE WANTS TINO.**
ATHENS, Dec. 8.
Returns from the plebiscite, held Sunday, continue to favor Constantine's return to Greece. It is apparent, however, that many failed to vote. It is also rumored that the Cabinet has requested Constantine to delay his return in view of the firm financial note of the Allies.**ARGENTINE'S POSITION.**
GENEVA, Dec. 8.
Honorio Pueyrredon, head of Argentine delegation to the League of Nations, informed the Associated Press last night that Argentina's withdrawal from the Assembly might probably be followed by a formal declaration of its intention to leave the League. The League Assembly today decided to stick to a slow and sure policy in amending the covenant, and to extend that policy to the interpretation of relations between Council and Assembly, with regard to their respective duties and jurisdictions under the covenant. The Canadian amendment, eliminating article 26, and the Argentine amendment declaring that all sovereign states shall be members of the League, that do not remain outside of their own choice, were referred to a special committee, which will study all the proposed changes in the covenant, and report to the next Assembly. The question as to what are the exact relations between the Council and the Assembly was temporarily and partially settled by the adoption of a sort of working basis in the form of four general principles, enunciated in the recent report of a committee, presided over by Balfour, with certain amendments.**OUT O' ORDER STOMACHS**
