WILL TAKE PART IN MEMORIAL PARADE.

There was a fine attendance at the regular weekly parade of the C.L.B. Cadets held at the Armoury on Thursday night. The officers present in kit were Lt.-Col. Goodridge, Capt. W. J. Higgins, H.C. and Mr. J. Barron as counsel for the defendants and Fisheries Department, respectively.

The case was as follows:—Until this year there were not any drawings for trap berths at Blackhead, but now that a draw had been held the people of the settlement object to those who drew berths in their waters coming to look for them. They claim that the place is reserved for them for ordinary net fishing.

After a considerable amount of discussion, it was finally decided that the holders of the trap berths can fish their traps, but they must give a portion of their catch to the people of Blackhead who are using nets.
