### Russian Relief.

"Russia," declares Catherine Breshkovsky, the "Grandmother of the Russian Revolution," in her message to the American people for succor, "Russia is flooded with tears and blood, and moans and cries out to the world. She is a living body, and her tortures cannot be looked upon cold-bloodedly as an extraordinary, never-before-witnessed experiment in social evolution. She is alive, and every pore of her body is shedding blood." Russia is not on the eve of famine, as was announced some months ago, but is having the very vitals of her people eaten out by hunger. Famine stalks gauntly through the land, carrying with it all the miseries and diseases that ensue from food shortage. Hunger has no distinctions. Rich and poor alike suffer, for what is the good of the wealth of Croesus, if there is no food to purchase, and those who are poor and have no money are in equal case with those who have. The harvests of Russia have failed, the country is exhausted as a result of the war and the subsequent terrible internal strife. Russian industries are disorganized, the means of transport destroyed, education is at a stand still. Without land produce, industry, means of transportation and education, Russia is facing inexpressible conditions of horror. Help is needed in this hour of Russian misfortune. The peasants, the main producers of the fruits of the earth, cannot help themselves. They have not the means to till the soil. They cry out for assistance, for relief; unless that is forthcoming the result will be terrible and unprecedented in the history of that or any other land.

Appeals are being made to the countries of European America for assistance in the shape of food, and to the credit of the people of these, be it said, the response has been instantaneous. Relief measures are being organized by various societies and Governments, but the quantity of foodstuffs required to feed the starving millions of Russia will be enormous and all the resources of the world will have to be drawn upon to provide sufficient supplies. A week's, nor a month's, nor six months will not avail. Nothing under one year's stock of food will be of the slightest use because it will take all of that time if not longer, for Russia to revive, and arise above her present condition. Under present circumstances it is doubtful if Newfoundland can assist in any way toward Russian relief. Not that the spirit of our people is not willing, but because of financial stringency. Yet there is a way perhaps by which this country may indirectly render assistance. Such a way is suggested by Mr. William White, Manager of the White Clothing Co., Ltd., in a letter published in the Telegram yesterday. It is a practical way too, and one that should commend itself to both the Government and the commercial interests, no less than to the whole body of fishermen. Taking the initiative is the duty of the Government in this instance, and as has already been pointed out, negotiations should be opened by Newfoundland's Executive with the British authorities, as well as other administrations concerned for the purchase of as much dry codfish as can be supplied by this country. There are many thousands of quintals of last year's fish in the various European markets, yet unsold. Fish not at all impaired in quality, and an excellent, nutritious and cheap article of diet, easily handled and easily cooked. The pur-

chase of the consignments sent to Europe from Newfoundland, by the Governments taking up the matter of Russian relief would be two-fold in its action. First it would lessen the congestion of stocks unsold and second would make room for the shipments of new fish now going in. There is also the added benefit of immediately turning this fish into cash, thus relieving the tightness of money, and releasing a goodly sum for the buying of the 1921 catch. Taken all round, we do not think that the Government should delay or hesitate in opening up such negotiations as will ultimately benefit all concerned, and in this way will Newfoundland be able to render her quota of help to unhappy and starving Russia.

### Police Court.

A drunk and disorderly who attempted to strike a young lady with his pipe was fined \$2 or 10 days.

A resident of Georgetown was convicted of a breach of Section 4 of the Consolidated Statutes, in having liquor in her possession. She was fined \$100.

A resident of Water Street was charged with having liquor in his possession pleaded not guilty. The evidence of Detectives Byrne and Lee showed that they visited defendant's home on July 30th and found there 4 bottles of imported liquor. The defendant being put in the witness box admitted having the liquor in his home, but that he had with others obtained it from Monroe's premises, South Side. According to his evidence some friend had discovered a keg of liquor in the landwash and when he appeared on the scene a large number of people were there filling tin cans, crocks, and hats and other utensils from the keg. The witness said he procured a large paint can full of the booze and after bringing it home he put it in bottles. The Judge took all the facts into consideration and fined the defendant \$100.

The funeral of the late James B. Slater which took place this afternoon from his late residence, Waterford Bridge Road, was largely attended. St. John's Masonic Lodge of which the deceased was a member, was represented by a Guard of Honor. Interment took place at the General Protestant Cemetery.

### Usurped Seats of the Mighty.

LATMAN ATTEMPTS TO ACT AS COUNSEL.

At the Central District Court this morning when the usual civil business was called, an amusing scene was witnessed. Sitting in the seats reserved for the legal profession was a well-dressed man of a collecting agency. A case was called and the agent appeared for the prosecution. Mr. George Ayre, who was defending, called the attention of the court to the prosecuting lawyer, saying that he had no right to act in that capacity. His Honor agreed and the offender was removed from the seat to another part of the court. Meanwhile Mr. Ayre asked for a dismissal of the case against his client which was granted and two similar cases likewise were dismissed and Mr. Ayre's clients went free. Some seventeen other cases of debt, which the agent had in hand had to be withdrawn. It is likely that the matter will be brought to the attention of the Law Society.
