Paris in Danger From Souvenir Shells.

In the first 15 days of September more than 800 hand grenades and large-calibre shells, of which 50 per cent were loaded, were picked up in the streets of Paris by the police. 40 of these dangerous souvenirs were found in one day in various parts of the city. In the same period only 10 grenades and one shell were voluntarily turned over to the police by their owners. The police, while admitting their helplessness in the situation, are unable to understand it. Several deaths have resulted in the past month from the throwing of these war munitions into the streets, and the police have issued repeated appeals to the owners to bring them to the police stations, promising that no trouble should result from the acknowledgment of their ownership, which is illegal.

Household Hints.

To clean gold lace, make a paste with 1oz. stale breadcrumbs, 1/2oz. magnesia, 1/2oz. cream of tartar, and spirit of wine, and apply with a small brush. When dry shake off crumbs, and rub with a chamomile feather.

To economise in coal, put a quantity of chalk at the back of your grate. Once hot it gives out a splendid heat, and is almost inexhaustible.

You can get rid of black beetles by "starving them out." Abolish crumbs, uncovered tins, pails or refuse, paper bags of foodstuffs, greasy sinks, and wet cloths, and dithe beetles will soon leave a place which does not provide them with a living.

When raking out ashes from the fire grate in the morning, fix a sheet of newspaper before the opening. This causes a draught which carries the dust up the chimney, and prevents its going on to the furniture.

Add a teaspoonful of salt to boiled starch to give a gloss to the linen, and make ironing easier.

You can freshen a stale loaf by putting it in a steamer over a pan of boiling water for five minutes.

Do not remove a gas mantle when it breaks at the "shoulder," but place the new one over it. This will lengthen on the life of the second mantle, and is said to save gas.

A teaspoonful of borax melted in a bowl of hot water cleans turned oak. Wash thoroughly, dry, and rub with linseed oil.

Vinegar added to the rinsing water on washing-day prevents the hands from roughening.

Old hair brushes which have become soft can be made hard and firm by dipping in a strong solution of alum.

When washing saten, rinse in water to which a little water has been added, and this will give a satiny gloss to the material.
