Flogging Still Legal in Maryland

Flogging as punishment, has been legalized by Maryland statute laws under every constitution the State has had from 1776 to the present time. It was common in the Colony before the Revolution. Under the statute of 1723, forgery, theft, counterfeiting, Sabbath breaking and blashemy were equally punishable by the lash. A person who swore in the presence of a magistrate or other public official was liable to a fine of 2s. 6d. for each "cussword"; and if the fine was not paid he received up to 39 lashes.

In those days floggings were public. It was not until about 1810 that scandalized Marylanders succeeded in having the exhibitions cut off from popular views by a law which required those punishments to be administered behind walls of jails or prisons.

Though public whippings were abolished, such punishments continued to be inflicted in private by sheriffs under order of the court for many years. The whipping post which was used in
