Cooper Got 18 Months

Saskatoon, May 30.—A. W. Cooper, the ex-Nutana merchant, who created a sensation in this city a year ago, when he took over the dry goods and grocery business of B. A. Archibald, was today sentenced to eighteen months at hard labor in Prince Albert.

Cooper was found guilty of defrauding the Marshall Wells Hardware company, Winnipeg, out of goods to the value of \$350. There was no less than six charges of obtaining goods under false pretenses brought against him. He has a wife and family in England. He was arrested in Calgary.

THE HALLS OF CONGRESS CLOSED MEMORIAL DAY

The United States People Are Honoring the Day

Washington, May 30.—The halls of congress and all executive departments were closed today while state-ments of the nation participated in the annual commemoration of Memorial day. Here an elaborate program filled the day, beginning with a street parade of veterans and soldiers, and including impressive services at Arlington cemetery, the national burial ground, old soldiers' homes, the congressional and battleground cemeteries and other places.

An impressive spectacle was the setting adrift of a flower-laden boat on the Potomac river, by the Spanish war veterans in honor of the nation's naval dead.

BOOTS AND SHOES ARE COSTING MORE

Inquiry into Cost of Living—Industrial Accidents During Month of April

Ottawa, May 30.—The May number of the Labor Gazette contains additional results of the inquiries being conducted by the department as to the price of commodities and the cost of living.

The cost of hides, tallow, leather, and boots are particularly dealt with and the figures produced show that the prices of these commodities were higher in 1908-09 than at any time in the previous twenty years.

Compared with prices for the decade 1890-99, inclusive the increase was approximately 45 per cent. The most noteworthy increase in the past year has been an exceedingly rapid advance of cowhides and calfskins, which has affected the price of boots and shoes.

There were sixteen trade disputes in progress in Canada during April, affecting 123 firms and caused a loss of 48,110 working days, eight of the disputes were terminated by negotiations by the parties concerned, and one by reference to a board of arbitration under the industrial disputes act. In the remaining case the places of the strikers were filled.

During April industrial accidents occurred to 430 individual workmen in Canada, of which 94 were fatal and 246 resulted in serious injury. The railway service heads the list with 18 killed and 40 injured and the lumbering industry comes second with 16 killed and 11 injured.

San Francisco, May 30.—Mrs. Gladys Emery Gunjlie Aoki daughter of Archdeacon John Emery, of the Episcopal diocese, whose violently romantic infatuation for the clergyman's Japanese house-boy ended in their marriage in Seattle on March 27, 1908, is seeking divorce. The young woman, accompanied by her dejected father and mother has gone to Carson, Nev., to establish the formal residence necessary preliminary to filing the suit.

THE "DRY" CAPTURE ANOTHER COUNTY IN IDAHO

Onside Sixteenth in State of Idaho to Place Ban on Intoxicants

Boise, Idaho, May 28.—Onside County was the sixteenth in Idaho to vote itself into the "dry" column today, the local option issue winning by the overwhelming majority of approximately 2500, with a few scattering precincts to hear from. The anti-temperance leaders now admit that they will not marshal over a total of 100 votes.

Very little interest was taken, it being conceded that the "drys" would carry the county by an overwhelming vote. There has not been an open saloon in the county for more than a year, through the refusal of the County Commissioners to grant a license.

The three corporate towns, the county voted dry by large majorities, considering the vote cast. Malad gave the drys 218 and the wets 41; Preston 337 drys, 123 wets; American Falls, 129 drys and 51 wets. It is now admitted that not more than 40 per cent. of the county vote was cast.

Cattle Embargo Not Consistent

Ottawa, May 30.—F. A. C. Bickerdike, the Canadian Trade commissioner at Belfast, reports to the department here that the imperial government is feeling the pressure of those who desire free importation of cattle and present outlook is that the embargo against Canadian animals cannot be consistently maintained. The result is that the dead meat trade is being advocated in Ireland as giving better prices and additional employment.

GETTING READY FOR CAMPAIGN

Lethbridge Conservatives Preparing to Arrange Their List of Voters

Lethbridge, May 28.—The Conservative Association acting on the idea that a provincial general election may be upon them any moment, last night instructed its executive committee to meet and arrange a plan for the preparation of their election lists and to report at the regular weekly meeting of the association next Friday night.

There was a lengthy discussion both before and after the motion was put instructing the executive to meet, from which the consensus of opinion appeared to be that the city should be divided up into small divisions a block or two in size, and that one man be told to prepare a list of the voters in each division and to keep it up-to-date. It also appeared to be the opinion that a branch of the association should be organized in North Lethbridge, but that matter was laid on the table until another meeting.

C. A. Magrath, M. P., was unanimously elected honorary president, which office had been left vacant at the last election of officers.

Mr. Chamberlain is Very Frail

London, May 30.—Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, with his wife, arrived from Cannes on Saturday evening. Mr. Chamberlain looked frail, as with the assistance of his wife and another member of the party, he made his way from the train to his carriage. He was somewhat tanned. His stay at Cannes appears to have benefited him. As he drove away he raised his hat to salutations of sympathetic onlookers.
