Sir Edward then made another stirring speech, concluding it by saying: Ready to Fight.

"We wish peace, but not at any price. We will preserve our birthright, and I tell those who govern us, without fear of hesitation, that if they wish to fight, then, by heaven, we are peady"
Repeated waves of cheering followed Sir Edward's re-entry into Ulster Hall. The large crowd then formed itself into a procession and marched through the principal streets of Belfast, cheering and singing. In some cases blank shots from revolvers were fired, but the police at no time had occasion to interfere with the marchers on account of disorder.
