Cause of Black Knot.

There seems to be a misunderstanding as to the cause of black knot by a great many, hence its spread so rapidly, and as we are determined to entirely wipe it out of this section, a few hints as to its origin and how best to exterminate it, may be of benefit at this time. In the first place, I am often asked, where it came from, which is hard for me to fully answer, but this I know, it came about the time the potato bug did, and it was in Michigan three or four years before it was found here. It was at London, Ont., two years before we became

acquainted with it here, and some of our trees here were destroyed before it was seen on the 1st concession. So it seems to have come from the north and west, perhaps Colorado. The knot is not caused as many think by a worm, but by a live vegetable germ or spore, which flies in the air, and becomes lodged in a seam or crack in the bark of the plum or cherry tree, and when warm weather comes, this germ gets hold of the sap and develops into a yellowish, soft enlargement Right here is where the moth gets in its work, and deposits its eggs (as it also does in many other kinds of decaying substances), and this is the

cause of the worms being found in the knot. Therefore the knot is the cause of the worm, and not the worm causing the knot, as many believe, by finding the worms therein. Some of very limited knowledge on the subject put their opinion against the scientists and all the best posted horticulturists in the country, and candidly and firmly assert it is a worm. Now, as to a preventative and cure, there are several treatments that have been success. fully used, and I will only give two or three of the most practicable pre ventatives. First one is, never let a knot become black, as it is then matured, and the germs begin to fly, which generally takes place in September and all winter. Another preventative is spraying thoroughly just before the warm weather sets in, in early spring, with a good spray pump something like the one manufactured at Aylmer, that has ease of operation, and force that will drive the liquid into those small pores and seams, and destroy by eating up the germ before it gets established in its new home. The safest and only reliable cure is by cutting out, and the sooner this is done after it is discovered the better. as the fruit will not amount to much on the end of a limb where there is a big knot, and by severing it early in its growth one saves the limb from becoming entirely ruined by the germ being conveyed down the limb, and requires to be cut a long way below the real knot, as by cutting just below it the germs or spores are very much in evidence; therefore, the earlier and farther down the limb is cut the better results. Let it be remembered that the burning of the branch or knot is very essential, as it will develope after the branch is cut and spread nearly or quite as bad laying on the ground as in the tree. This is the reason the government has embodied in the act that they must be burned, subject to a penalty not less than \$2 or more than \$20 for first offence. Just here I think it will not be out of place to solicit every person's co-operation in the work of exterminating the knot. As I have been appointed inspector any information received will be strictly confidential and will be acted on at once. Thanking those who have so cheerfully destroyed some trees and cut and burned all knot on their premises; also, thanking the Editor in advance for space in his valuable paper,
